## India--Home of Nonresistance

NDIA is the home of the first of the races of the Aryan Epoch. The first Aryans entered India probably between 2,000 and 1500 B.C. from Central Asia. The chronicled history of India dates from about 650 B.C. but the earliest precise date is 326 B.C. when Alexander the Great invaded the country. The historical data for this article have been obtained from Rawlinson's Cultural History of India, Smith's Oxford History of India, and other sources.

India has an area of about two-thirds that of the United States. Its population is approximately India, 350,000,000, about 75 per Land of the cent of which is Hindu, Brahmans 20 per cent Mohammedan, and five per cent di-

vided between Christians, Sikhs, and Parsees. Geographically India is divided into three main sections: Hindustan in the North and West, the Deccan in the central part, and Tamil Land in the far South, inhabited by the Dravidians.

Aryan is the most important family of the Indian languages, of which there is a bewildering number. The Indo-Aryan language later became known as Sanskrit, the sacred language, and is of the same family as Persian, Latin, Greek, and English. India is primarily a Hindu country, land of the Brahmans, who have carried their ideas into every corner of it by peaceful penetration and not by the sword. All Hindus reverence the Brahmans and venerate the cow as their greatest friend. Ahimsa, the doctrine of nonviolence to all living creatures, is universally accepted.

According to the Rosicrucians, central Asia was the cradle of the Aryan races. Before the inundation and sinking of Atlantis in prehistoric times, that portion of the Original Semitic race which had been faithful to the instructions of their spiritual Leaders were led from the doomed continent to central Asia, and there were prepared to be the seed of the seven Aryan races. So far, five of these have been developed, the fifth of which is the Anglo-Saxon-Teutonic, and two more are to come.

The Hindus worship a threefold deity: Brahma the creator, Vishnu the preserver, and Siva the destroyer. The original Dravidian religion was HINDUISM, demon worship, now largely BUDDHISM, replaced by Hinduism. Buddhism was originated by Gau-JAINISM tama in central India in the sixth century B.C., but is now almost extinet in India. Jainism, founded by Mahavira in the same century, is somewhat similar to Buddhism, and is now confined to a small sect in western India. The Jesuits tried their hand at converting India in 1580 but with only slight success.

The four scriptures or Vedas, accepted as inspired revelation, are so ancient that no date can be attached to their origin. They consist of hymns, invocations to the gods, the powers of nature personified. The Upanishads are supplementary philosophical tracts. The Mahabharata, a gigantic epic of moral teachings, includes the Bhagavad Gita, a profound philosophical treatise. The Brahman teachings of rebirth and karma are generally accepted in India.

Caste, a Brahman institution, dominates all Hindu India. There are four castes: Brahmans or priests; warriors and the governing class; trade and agriculture; laborers. The small number of Hindus not included in any of the castes are called outcastes, and are regarded as "untouchable." Caste regulates marriage, diet, which is vegetarian, and most social customs. Caste, however, prevents the development of a real national spirit and makes unified national action difficult.

There are four main periods in Indian history: Ancient India; the Hindu Period from the Maurya dynasty 322 B.C. to the Mohammedan conquest, A.D. 1193; the Mohammedan Period from the Conquest to A.D. 1761; the British Period

THE GOLDEN British, however, exercised only a nominal control over the country until 1818, when the British

government of the East India Company was definitely established as the controlling power in India. In 1858 the government was transferred from the East India Company to the Crown. The Golden Age of India, in the fifth century A.D. during the Gaupta Dynasty, came within the Hindu Period. Peace largely prevailed during that Age, and literature, art, and science flourished. It was the peak of Indian development.

The practical end of Mohammedan or Moslem rule in India by Mogul emperors of the Mongolian race came with the death of Aurangzeb, the last of these emperors of any importance, in 1707. The succeeding century, until British control became effective, was known as the "Great Anarchy." It was a period of plunder, tyranny by the native princes, and general destitution and misery, and no leader worthy of remembrance appeared. By 1818 Britain had brought a fair degree of order out of this chaos. Her primary object was trade, and governmental control only as a supplementary feature necessary to make trade possible under reasonably stable conditions.

After 1818 a number of notable reforms were made, including: the practical abolition of suttee, in which Hindu widows burned themselves to death on the funeral pyre of their deceased husbands; discouragement of child marriage; Thuggee, a secret system of semireligious murder with the supposed sanction of the Hindu goddess Bhawani, was broken up and the Thugs dispersed in 1837; slavery, which had always existed more or less in India, was abolished in 1843. Devastating famines have occurred in India from early times, but in the last century they have in the main been checked.

India has produced a number of modern, distinguished literary men and sci-

TAGORE, gore, a poet whose inspired writings brought him the Nobel Prize, and Sir Jagadish Bose, noted botanist.

India has several excellent universities, the oldest of which are those of Bombay, Calcutta, and Madras.

Los Angeles was recently visited by Mme. Kamaladevi Chattopadhyay, a noted Hindu woman. She represents the Indian Nationalists, who are seeking independence for India. She stated that the popular movement in India is fundamentally democratic and as much against the feudal Indian princes as against British rule. Russian Communism, she says, is abhorrent to the Indian mind because it is based on arbitrary force.

Gandhi, the friend of outcastes, is the outstanding figure in India today. He was educated in England and studied law in London. He first developed his technique of passive resistance against the government in South Africa, to get better treatment for the Hindus there. In 1920 he started a passive resistance and non-cooperation movement for tax and other reforms in India, and for eventual self-government. This movement is still active and is gaining momentum.

We will now briefly examine the esoteric history of India. Max Heindel, the authorized messenger of the Rosicrucian Order, states that we, the Egos of the fifth Aryan race of Western Europe and America, were at one time incarnated in He further states that the pioneers of any period or race bring that race up to its peak of development and then pass on by rebirth to the succeeding races in the evolutionary scheme. We quote from his lecture, "The Coming Force":

"We of the Western nations at one time inhabited Hindu bodies; that was the time when India was in its glory, when the race was evolving

both physically and spir-WESTERN Egos Once itually. That was in the so-called Golden Age, when IN INDIA the sacred writings came

into existence, when the great temples were built, when the spiritual and material evolution of India was at its height. But man was destined to master the material world to the full. . . . Thus we (the spirits now inhabiting the Western race bodies) left the Hindu bodies and built in turn the bodies of the succeeding races, gradually attaining higher and higher levels of material development . . . .

"The Hindu race has been degenerating ever since we left it, and is now inhabited by the most backward spirits born into Aryan bodies. But as we implanted such strong spiritual tendencies in them, heredity has yet preserved that trait in the Hindu [vital or etheric] bodies so that they are more amenable to spiritual impacts than the more material bodies of later races, yet it is not as high an order of spirituality as expressed when we were in Hindu bodies. The bodies have degenerated and the spirits are less evolved than we, so that the race distinguishes itself more by a highly analytical mind than by true spirituality.

"Having retained a full realization of, and an implicit faith in, the doctrine of rebirth which the Westerner has lost temporarily, and being backward, the Hindus are naturally indolent and do not seek to improve their physical conditions in earth life nor between incarnations. As

a consequence the country also has degenerated with the bodies, and the resulting suffering has for its purpose to awaken them to the necessity of concentrating on material things that they may learn to conquer the earth as we are doing. They are to follow in our footsteps and forget for a time their spiritual being in order to master the important lessons of this material world. . . . Our plenitude and material prosperity has the opposite end in view; it is destined to cause in us the nausea of satiety, to drive us to a realization of the worthlessness of material things, and to cause us to turn anew to the spiritual."

In addition Max Heindel states that since the Hindus are not as firmly en-

meshed in matter as the FUTURE Western races, that is, MATERIALISM they have not involved so IN INDIA far into matter, they possess a certain clairvoyance

which, however, will gradually disappear as they progress into their destined materialistic period mentioned above. Moreover, he says, the Hindu breathing exercises are dangerous for the Western aspirant though necessary for the Hindu esotericist in order to raise the vibratory pitch of the atoms of the Hindu race body so that the vital body may be liberated from it. But the vibratory pitch of Western bodies has already been accelerated by evolution, and therefore the use of Hindu breathing exercises by the Westerner is likely to produce an improper cleavage in the vital body, leading either to consumption or insanity.

In conclusion, India doubtless will achieve self-government, either within or without the framework of the British Empire, in the not very distant future, and then take up her destined material development, which she has hitherto neglected. India has a distinct mission and part to play in assisting to bring about the era of Universal Brotherhood, which is surely on the way. And India has the possibility and capacity for developing and advancing into a second Golden Age.

### Our Neighbor the Universe

URPOSE, discretion, discrimination, and intelligence may be seen in the atoms that comprise

the universe, that make up minerals and plants, as well as those that constitute the higher animals and man. Edison, as far back as 1920 in the Scientific American Magazine declared, as the result of experimentation, "I do not find matter to be inert, acted upon by an outside force. Every atom is possessed by a certain amount of primitive intelligence. The existence of an intelligent Creator, to my mind, is proved by chemistry."

Again, J. Arthur Thomson, the great English scientist, affirms that God is in Nature, and reminds us further that Dame Nature, "when queried as to her secret in carrying on her work, replies, 'I make things make themselves.' ' This is a parable or principle in all so-called matter, for God by His inherent Presence makes things make themselves. Our neighbor the universe may be considered His embodiment.

Dr. Lawrence P. Jacks, Editor of the Hibbert Journal, who considers man's duty and responsibility to extend to stones, trees, plants, as well as to animals and man, says, "Between matter and spirit there is no absolute distinction, no radical schism, no opposition. Matter is the first stage in our apprehension of spirit; spirit is matter fully apprehended. The spiritual interpretation of the universe arrives on the scene 'not to destroy but to fulfill' the material. go through the material to get to the spiritual-spirit cannot get on without matter any more than thought can get on without speech, its expression."

Many of our modern scientists, psychologists, philosophers, are finding the universe to be composed of one substancespirit. Sir James Jeans thinks of "each individual consciousness as a brain cell in a universal mind"; Sir William Crookes, while lecturing before a body of chemists, dealt with the ability of atoms to manifest intelligence and sensation, and declared that "we must regard these tiny entities as ultimate factors in all physical and chemical processes—entities which seem to be easiest understood when considered as centers of force, persistent souls that move about refecting and selecting"; and Tyndall pointed out the fact that "atoms seemed to be instinct with the desire for life."

We need to see life whole, for all meaning is in wholeness. In cutting up the human body we do not find the mysterious source of its vitality. In separating the flower of a plant from its muddy roots we will not understand or find that for which we are looking. Something very similar happens in a much more important way when a man loves life and hates death, or clings to youth and rejects old age, which is like expecting a mountain to have only one slopethat which goes up-whereas to be a mountain it must go up and down. The meaning is in the whole, and not only the meaning but the very existence of the

thing. The whole is greater than the sum of all its parts-there is an unearned increment due possibly to the natural reaction of the various parts upon each other. In the same way many working together on a problem give greater results than each working separately. Cooperation tends towards abundant life, but isola-

tion toward futility and death. "Where two or three are gathered together, there am I in the midst . . . I am the vine, ye are the branches . . . apart from Me ye can do nothing."

The Sermon on the Mount introduces us to the kingdom of heaven and gives us to understand that the flowers in the field are dear to the heart of the universe, that the sparrows are objects of divine solicitude, and that a terrible doom is pronounced upon those who cause "the little ones" to stumble. Our duties to man are all in a piece with our duties to nature-to flowers, sparrows, and countrysides-duties which include every atom or other minute constituent of the so-called material universe that we are called upon to handle or make use of, such as stones, plants, trees, birds, animals,

nails, putty, wood, smoke, fire, paper, waste, as well as thoughts, words, prayers, emotions, attitudes, atmosphere. Man's duty is not only to his fellow man, but to his neighbor the universe.

How responsible man is for the atmosphere he generates, for the thoughts he casts into the universe, which, as psychologists tell us, are things with real personalities which travel throughout the universe as separate entities doing good or ill.

The atmosphere close to any planet is like the aura of a person; the atmosphere around the earth is fillled with the vibrations, attitudes, thoughts of earth's peo-This is why hate and war are so devastating. They permeate the atmosphere, with no regard for responsibility

to our neighbor, the universe. They destroy the law of harmony. The great guns booming through the air cause consternation in the atomic world. The rhythm of harmony is broken into little fragments. It is because of man's breaking into God's laws of unity that after effects of war are seen in explosions, in earthquakes

neighbor the earth by enlightening her mind, her thought-house. The great cohesive force combining all the different atoms into one united whole is that power of blending with each other which we call "love." The law of love is the law of good designed by the great Creator.

Of late years psychologists, particularly of the Freudian School of thought have discovered a new virtue and a new vice in man-the virtue is called "accepting life," and the vice, "escaping from life." These phases of being are not of course new, but have been known throughout history by a hundred different names. Carlyle spoke of them as the "Everlasting Yea and the Everlasting Nay."

Jung, the great psycho-analytical

psychologist, finds the subconscious mind to be personal only on its surface. He tells us it is "essentially collective, racial, and universal." He has discovered that in dreams men and women spontaneously produced myths and symbols thousands of years old of which they had no conscious knowl-The subconscious edge. mind represents the his-

tory of the race, always in the state of becoming, and representing unfettered nature, demoniac and divine, painful and pleasant, hideous and lovely, cruel and compassionate, destructive and creative. It is the source of heroism, love, inspiration as well as of fear, hatred, and crime. It is, indeed, as if we carried inside of us an exact duplicate of the world we see around us, for our neighbor the universe is a mirror of the soul, and the soul a mirror of the universe. When one begins to feel the subconscious he begins to understand not only himself but others as well, and when he looks upon human crime and stupidity he can say with real feeling, "There but for the grace of God go I-and probably once, that way I went."

We are children of nature and our roots go beyond our ken. Just as there is the conflict between good and so-called evil in the physical universe, so in man there is the conflict of gods and demons with the ego. It should be remembered. however, that the word "demon" coming from the Greek daemon does not necessarily mean an evil entity, but simply a supernatural intelligence, a spirit, ghost, or influence. Socrates had his daemon or "familiar spirit" which was of a high order. Oftentimes what we see in man, or in our neighbor the universe, as evil, is only lesser good, unripe good, or "the partial evil" Alexander Pope calls "universal good." Even an ounce of common slime mixed with sand, soot,

> clay, water, on the footpath, may in time, and through chemicalization become porcelain, a sapphire, an opal, a diamond. Two men look into a pond. and one says, "I see a quantity of mud, a shoe. and waste paper." The other says, "I see all these, but also the glorious reflection of the sky, the possibilities of the dewdrop, the rain, the infinite

beauty of snowflakes and the crystal."

Matter, as our modern scientists are already suspecting, is non-existent save as phenomena which are a manifestation of that primordial energy consisting of the electron whose ultimate source is Mind. "Matter is thus a development of thought," Evans-Wendt tells us. "Its atomic components and their electronic framework have no real existence of their own, any more than have other phenomena-matter being crystallized energy, mental in form. Thus the external universe is a psychological compound of mind."

Agreeing with Wendt, the great astronomer James Jean, in his New Background of Science, says, "Nothing has come into modern science that is not mental. We see mechanical concepts continually giving place to mental." We may see, furthermore, that the discarding of mechanical concepts will in time mean the total disappearance of matter and of the mechanical, which will be replaced by mind reigning supreme and alone. Regarding this fact, Evans-Wendt comments, saying, "The dualism of matter and mind seems likely to disappear through substantial matter resolving into a creation and manifestation of mind." Western science has now reached substantially the same view concerning reality which early sages of India reached many centuries ago.

Our neighbor the universe is One, as "The Lord thy God is One." Christ Jesus, the God-man said, "I and my Father are One." "God is Spirit." The same fact is told us in the Upanishads of India which declare that this universe, which is all movement, is pervaded by

one supreme Unity.

Yet in this present life before we can unite we must first divide: before we can appreciate the One, we must know diversity and the many. We are only aware of life and life is only able to manifest because it is divided into innumerable pairs of opposites. For example, we know motion only by contrast with stillness, we know light by darkness, heat by cold, love by hate, joy by sorrow. To see life whole is to understand these opposites, or opposing qualities as essential to its existence. Much is in a state of becoming, a partial so-called evil which is universal good: the whole cannot be successfully taken apart. Isolation means death-"Apart from Me ye can do nothing." God is both Creator and Destroyer. We have but to witness the present time and the near future with the changing order and the large numbers of human beings passing from this planet in the wars. St. Paul tells us "There is no power but what is ordained of God."

To find peace or happiness is to "live and let live," to be one with our neighbor the universe. The greater the sense of distinction from the rest of the universe, the greater the tension, the fighting, and the discord. Happiness is to find complete union and harmony with life, with God, with the Self of the universe, and to realize that the whole might of the universe is at work in one's every thought and action, however trivial and small. This is a fact true of all men, all things, but only the spiritual man sees its significance—a fact which gives a subtly different quality or "atmosphere" to his life.

The thought of all being in God is modern to the West, but ancient to the East. It has occurred to a few that the ways of nature are not to be corrected but to be understood. We see nothing wrong with our neighbor the universe when understood, any more than a bird sees anything wrong with an egg. Assuredly neither earth nor egg has completed its growth. The world evolves un-

ceasingly.

It is difficult for us to imagine life a century ago, yet surely it was right for its period, just as the life today is right for today. All life is a great design; every part of it dependent on the other parts, interlocked, intertwined, moving in harmony, free in action and inevitable in reaction in its special time and place, but in no other. Man's scope of right and wrong, or morality, extends far beyond the boundaries of human society. Morality is "universal." It extends to the non-human world, and includes man's acceptance of the universe in its relation to himself. He must create some bit of new value in it, even if it is only making two blades of grass grow where only one grew before, or it may be the mending of a broken leg of a sparrow.

Although man appears to be separated from nature and to live only in his self-conscious center, this is an illusion. At this very moment he has a certain amount of union and harmony with the entire universe or he would not exist. Simple facts often elude man; he needs to become as a little child. Let him but open his eyes and everywhere he will see God, his Neighbor the Universe. Let him "be still and know."

URING past ages various religions have been given to humanity by the higher ones having

our evolution in charge—an outer teaching for humanity in general, an inner

teaching for the pioneers.

About two thousand years ago the majority of humanity had reached a point of such crystallization that assistance was needed for them to go forward. The Christ, a Ray of the Cosmic Christ, came and made the supreme sacrifice by becoming the indwelling planetary earth spirit, thereby making it possible for us to secure purer material for our bodies than before.

We read in our teachings, "Deceit and illusion cannot be allowed to endure forever," and so the Redeemer appeared to cleanse the passion-filled blood, to 
preach the truth which shall set us free 
from this body of death, to inaugurate 
the immaculate conception along lines 
most crudely indicated in the science of 
eugenics, to prophesy a new age, a new 
heaven and a new earth of which He 
the true Light, will be the Genius; an 
age wherein will dwell the "righteousness 
and love for which all the world is sighing and seeking."

Previous to His coming only the elect few were allowed to enter the Temple, but with His coming the veil of the Temple was rent for "whosoever will" to enter in; meaning those who were also willing to pay the price by living a life of selfabnegation or loving, self-forgetting service to others.

In 1313 a high spiritual teacher whom we call Christian Rose Cross founded the Rosicrucian Order—an order whose purpose was to counteract the materialistic tendencies so rampant. Members of the order worked secretly to aid humanity.

In the first decade of the twentieth century the time had come to give out the teachings of the order publicly. Max Heindel, our beloved leader, was chosen to be the messenger of the Brothers and he was given the information contained in The Rosicrucian Cosmo-Conception. This Cosmo-Conception contains a sane logical teaching that gives satisfactory answers to the questionings of the intellect, so that the religious life may be lived; a teaching, which if lived, makes possible a sane mind, a soft heart, and a sound body: a teaching which is the path of spiritual attainment for the coming age or dispensation.

For those of us who have received this humanitarian teaching, it is our responsibility as well as our privilege to help our brother to extricate himself from matter by teaching him the true principles upon which our lives are based. Science, art, and religion each possess one of these attributes in a measure. It is the purpose of the Rosicrucian Fellowship to unite and harmonize each with the other by teaching a religion that is both scientific and artistic; and to gather all churches into one great Christian brotherhood. Our Cosmo-Conception explains that the purpose of the Rosierucian Fellowship is to give an explanation of the problems of life that will satisfy both the mind and the heart. The Rosicrucian Fellowship functions under the command of the Christ to preach the

gospel and heal the sick. To preach the gospel not alone with words but by what we emanate by our every act and thought.

We read in The Teachings of An Initiate: "To comply with the second command the Elder Brothers have evolved a system of healing which combines the best points in the various schools of today with a method of diagnosis and treatment as certain as it is simple, and thus a long step has been taken to lift the healing art from the sands of experiment to the rock of exact knowledge." The Brothers came to the conclusion that "pride of intellect, intolerance, and impatience of restraint" would be the besetting sins of our day, and they formulated their philosophy so that it satisfies the heart at the same time that it appeals to the intellect, and teaches man how to escape restraint by mastering self.

"The thousands of appreciative letters from people all over the world, in the highest ranks and in the lowest walks of life, attest the great soul hunger and the great satisfaction that all classes of people find in this teaching. But as time goes on, fifty years, a century or two hence, when scientific discoveries have given color to more of the things stated in the Cosmo-Conception, when intellects have become yet broader, the Rosicrucian teachings will give satisfaction of soul to millions of enlightened spirits."

Mr. Heindel tells us of receiving help from the Brother to contact the fourth region of the World of Concrete Thought and there receive the teaching and understanding of that which is contemplated as the highest ideal and mission of The Rosicrucian Fellowship. He states, "I saw our headquarters and a procession of people coming from all parts of the world to receive the teaching. I saw them issuing thence to carry balm to afflicted ones near and far."

When we bring to mind what Mrs. Max Heindel has so often told us in her talks of the pioneer days—how, in 1911, they came to Mt. Ecclesia, a barren bean field, with little money, a few hundred dol-

lars, but with stout hearts and a world of faith and courage and enthusiasm for the work which they were about to startand then look about us today, we see a veritable little city with its paved roads, trees, and foliage, its Temple, its lovely healing department building, and wonderful Mt. Ecclesia Sanitarium; all these and more; an institution that Southern California can well be proud of, built by the love offerings of thousands of loyal students and the sale of our books. When we remember that all this has been accomplished in less than thirty years it is easy to visualize what the coming years will bring forth. Our beautiful teachings are fast spreading all over the whole planet; our work is growing with leaps and bounds as we go forward in harmonious aspiration toward the goal that our leader has set for us. When, through our unity of purpose, our aspirations, our love to humanity (for love to humanity generates love to God)-when our love shall have become high enough, pure enough, holy enough, then shall we give birth to pure white light and our etheric healing temple, interpenetrating the physical structure, shall become a blazing white fire, with its points, as wings, reaching up to the heaven world, forming a cup or matrix which will hold and bring to earth the Universal Solvent or Panacea for all the world's woe. Then will the vision of Max Heindel be fulfilled and "a procession of people shall be coming from all parts of the earth . . . issuing thence to carry balm to afflicted ones near and far."

We come together then in a convention to establish a stronger bond of fellowship among our members, to learn to work in co-operation, for our next step is group work on both planes. HE teachings of Rebirth when presented unto me the first time in The Rosicrucian Cosmo-Con-

## Mother Shipton's Prophecies

ALF a century before America was discovered, "Mother Shipton," the Yorkshire seeress,

prophesied the discovery of an unknown land in which gold would abound. She saw the automobiles and railroads of today with the many accidents they would cause, the telephone and the telegraph, divers, submarines, airships and the great iron ships which have superseded vessels of wood. She foresaw the great political upheavals in the world, notably in France, her alliance with England and an amalgamation of the Anglo-Saxon races which may yet come to pass, notwithstanding their present strife. She beheld the emancipation of the Jew and his preferment to positions of prominence and an unprecedented spread of knowledge among those of even the most lowly estate, ending with the prediction of certain upheavals of the earth's crust whereby old lands will become submerged and new land appear, and in 1991 she foresees the end of the world.

The last-named prophecies will probably cause most of us to shake our heads in a skeptical manner, but if we give the matter a little thought the idea may not seem so far-fetched. We know that upheavals of the earth have taken place in the past, and earthquakes and volcanic outbursts show us that the subterranean activities are not suspended by any means. The writer has seen for a number of years great subterranean caverns filled with oil and gas which run in a general direction from Maine across the American continent in a southwesterly direction, beneath Southern California and far out into the South Pacific Ocean. Their explosion would make a

great gap in the earth. At the same time he sees an archetype in the process of construction which shows the shape the earth will take at that place when a cataclysm or series of cataclysms have broken up the present shape of this continent and the adjoining ocean. Perhaps it is hazardous to set a time when this remodeling of the earth will begin, but the archetype or matrix molded in mindstuff, and representing the creative thought of the Grand Architect and His builders seems so nearly complete that judging by the progress made during the years the writer has watched its construction it seems safe to say that by the middle of the present century (1950), if not before, the upheavals will have started and it is not at all incredible that there may be one of such a magnitude in 1991 that the ancient Seeress was justified in judging it the end of the world, or perhaps the writer is premature in judging that the upheavals will start in the middle of the century; they may be deferred to the end, only time can decide, but certain it is that preparations for a great change have been going on for centuries and are now nearing their completion in the invisible world. Therefore we may expect soon to see Mother Shipton's prophecy concerning this matter fulfilled as the ones mentioned in the beginning of our note have been.

### Have I Lived Before?

A Personal Experience

HE title of this article is not original, but long before I had read it, I had often formed the

sentence in my mind so that it was but an echo of what I had been thinking.

As a child I had an unusual amount of imagination and seemed to live apart from those who were nearest and dearest to me. I was always asking what seemed to my family most impossible questions to answer and was told to run along and play with my dolls and not think about such absurd things. As I grew older questions persisted in crowding in the spaces of my mind until I began realizing that there was some truth in what seemed to the others but a child's fancies from an over-vivid imagination. And they were no fancies to me, but realities. The future was to disclose at a very early age that I was destined to find there was a meaning and knowledge back of it all.

From my twenty-first year events of great importance took place in my life, and from then on to this day has been a life lived from day to day, in company of those who have passed on to the higher life and have opened the door to me.

On November 28, 1904, I married a young man who gave promise of becoming an artist of great achievement. I met him while he was redecorating the interior of our church, and having the same talent, we were naturally drawn to each other; in fact, it seemed as if we had known each other in prenatal days, as we seemed to speak and think each other's thoughts, and we felt we had always been. But he was destined to depart this life three weeks to the day we were married. His passing and the seeming tragedy in my life began the first chapter in the book of understanding.

One night during that brief time of

our marriage, I was doing a little sketch for a friend for Christmas; it was while we were discussing the beauty of the little scene I was painting, that he suddenly said: "Claire, how much beauty people could bring into their lives, if only they tried to understand nature. Do you know that as we are born, our future is really stamped in the palms of our hands, and as we grow we increase those lines there as indelibly as if they were printed in words by an unseen hand; our very desires and actions are mirrored from the reflection of our souls; our hands contain the secret of our lives, but those truths are revealed to those who have clear vision, who know and understand." He took my hand as he said this and turned the palm upwards; after a moment he looked at me and said: "Do you know that your palm reveals to me that you are to be married twice, and that I am the first one?" I said in dismay, "Oh! why do you say such a thing? nothing can happen to you; why, Ray, you haven't ever been seriously sick in your life." He answered. "All very true, but things that are to be, will be, and we couldn't change our destiny if we tried."

That same night we were both awakened from sleep by a dream and while
each dream differed in every way from
the other, yet we knew that they were a
warning that something was about to
take place in our lives, and we should
experience sorrow. I had a brother who
was suffering from an incurable sickness
and whose death seemed very near. We
thought possibly the dream might have
portended to him. We discussed the matter for a time, and before going to sleep
again, my husband said, "If anything
should happen to you I could not bear
it—at least I should not marry again." I

replied, "And I shouldn't marry again, either." He said, "Oh, yes, you would, Claire, for didn't I just tell you when I read your palm you would, for it is your destiny. But remember, if you do and are unhappy, I'd know it; even if you are ever in trouble, or need comfort call on me, I'll never forsake you."

On a Sunday evening two nights after the events just related, we had been for a long walk: it was a beautiful winter night, and we both seemed exhilarated. Ray had been smoking his pipe and seemed very contented and happy. I was reading. After a while I happened to look up and caught him looking at me with a very mystifying and questioning look in his eyes. I said, "Oh! I know your thoughts." He said, still searching my face and then looking straight at me: "Yes, I believe you do. I was thinking how very happy I am, and the words of that beautiful new song so recently published ran through my mind (Just a gleam of Heaven in her eyes) and I wondered whether such a happiness had come into the life of the writer as has entered into ours." The words of the song have always remained a green spot in my memory for they revealed to me when he repeated them, the beauty of the soul of the man I had married. I shall write them down for my readers' benefit since they played so important a part in what was to follow-

"You ask me why there's love-light in my eyes?

Why I'm so happy today?

If you could only look deep in my heart Wonderful love you'd see.

Many the times have I laughed at such bliss,

Never dreamed I of such sweet love as

My heart was captured with love, 'twas enraptured,

When first I beheld her and saw-

"Just a gleam of Heaven in her eyes
Just a little sunshine, that I prize;
Just a soul awakening, blue as the azure
skies,

Just a gleam of Heaven in her eyes-"

Then he ended by saying, "Yes, Claire, we are very happy, but it isn't going to last."

And the very next day, the fulfillment of that remark began. He was off to work bright and early as usual, and left the house in a very cheerful mood. All day long he stated the words of that song haunted him, and he found himself humming and singing it without interruption to the amusement of his helper, who incidentally happened to be a neighbor of my family at home and had known me from childhood, had witnessed our marriage, and accompanied my husband wherever he had work.

Shortly before his work for the day was about finished, he had to remove a fountain that had been delivered to the church that day and the truckman had set it down in front of a panel he was decorating. He had been in the workshop when they placed it there. Instead of asking his helper's assistance to help . remove it, he moved the fountain alone, and ruptured himself internally. It weighed almost four hundred pounds, and he was very slight of build; in reporting the incident to me, he stated when he started to turn it around it felt no heavier than a pebble, but the moment he set it down, he felt a premonition it was to prove his undoing, and despite the wonderful doctors' and nurses' care he succumbed to his injuries in less than five days.

Two nights previous to his passing I had a dream that I was sitting on a rough-box; I was wearing a black dress and had on a white apron; my face was buried in the folds of the apron and I seemed to be crying bitterly, when I heard my name called. I looked up and saw coming toward me in a long, flowing white robe, my brother who at the time was so ill at home. He seemed so tall and beautiful and when he came up close to me he put his hand on my shoulder, and said, "What are you crying for?" and I looked up at him and said: "Oh! John, I am crying because Ray is going to leave me." He said, "Yes, he is, but he isn't going alone. I am going with him." With that I started to cry again and my mother seemed to appear on the scene, and she exclaimed, "What's the matter? What's the matter?" My brother answered her, saying, "Nothing. Only comfort her."

I awakened immediately. I did not even know I had fallen asleep as I was sitting in a chair by the bed. I turned up the light and looked at Ray; I could see a great change had taken place and in twenty-four hours he was gone. My brother died ten days after. I was home again and with him before he died. He said just shortly before he died, "Well, Claire, Ray has gone on before me, but it won't be long now and I'll be with him." He was twenty-five and was married and had two

small sons, one of whom followed his daddy a year later. My husband was twenty-one. He has kept close to me through all the years warning me always if anything was about to happen to me or my family.

A few months

after my husband's death, his sister who was in Minneapolis (and could not get here for the funeral because she was ill at the time with tonsillitis) came to visit me. She was an accomplished pianist, giving concerts in different cities, traveling most of the time. This brother had always been a favorite of hers and news of his death was preceded by a vision of a flash of lightning which illumined her whole room. In the light was suspended a cross, and his head, with face turned upward, was in the center with a halo just above and around it. A few hours afterwards a telegram arrived stating he had passed away at the time the vision Boy out this occurred.

She was much disturbed and grieved about it and had been very anxious to see me and learn about the details of his pass-

ing. And after meeting her, I fell very much in love with her, as she was the exact likeness of her brother. She wanted me to accompany her on her trips, and while I was eager to go, I could scarcely bear to make the decision since it meant leaving my family and I had a great bond of love and affection for my parents, who had done everything for meand not having been away long enough to hardly know the difference of a separation, I naturally fitted back into my old life as if I had never left it. But it seemed, too, as if I could not bear to have her leave my sight as I was always seeing my loved one in her countenance; so I called upon Ray for help and it came through my being stricken with an acute attack of appendicitis on the very eve

of the day before we were to leave. I had really made all plans to go with her and everything was in readiness for our departure.

Well, the doctors were with me all night. They were waiting further developments before deciding whether to

operate or not operate. When morning came my condition had not improved, and my sister-in-law was forced to leave in order to meet her husband who was awaiting her in a near-by city, for she had an important engagement to fill there. She was loathe to leave without me, but it was what she had to do. And she was not out of the house five minutes when my sickness vanished as mysteriously and quickly as it came, to the astonishment as well as amazement of the doctors who were really confounded. My mother merely said, "Oh, I am so happy-I couldn't bear that you should leave."

Some years afterwards, twenty-five, in September on Labor Day, we had a family reunion of my family and my first husband's family. They were all with me, and we had a very wonderful time, since it was really the first time we were all together since his passing on. After everyone had gone and I was alone again, I lay on the day-bed, tired but happy, thinking of all the things that had transpired in those twenty-five years, and I spoke and said: "Ray, do you know how very happy this event has made me today? Why can't you show me by some sign that you do know? I should be still happier, if such a thing can be." And of a sudden I felt a lump under my shoulder. Reaching back, I felt for whatever it was and pulled out the Sunday papers from the day before, which some one lying there had read and left undisturbed until then. As I drew them out, one word sprawled across the top attracting my attention. It was a name and I stared, thinking it unbelievable, for the name was the name of my husband and being an unusual one, I had not seen it in print from the time of his death. I opened the page and the title of the article was a book review of "All Quiet on the Western Front" by Erich Maria Remarque, of which the surname (Remarque) was the Christian or given name of my husband; and I knew then that he knew and had taken that way to answer my request, and I was very much at peace and strangely comforted.

In repeating this incident to a very dear friend who is a Theosophist and

understands, I happened to say, "Oh, but if I could only see him; you do not know how much I long to." She said, "Oh, but you can; he is right here now. Can't you see or feel him?" I answered, "No. But I wish I could," With that, a child delivering the evening papers handed one to me as I stood on the steps talking to my friend. And as I reached out to take the paper from her, I fell back, startled her by saying, "Oh, Ray, it is you," for in that child's face, he had materialized and I saw his face as I had seen it when we were married. ## Why Not Harness Vibrations?

EVERAL years ago when pondering over a statement made by an electrical engineer—that elec-

trical engineers know how to generate and use electricity, but they do not know just what it is—the thought in answer came—that electricity is highly condensed vibrations. This seemed a logical and correct answer as I had seen electricity generated and knew that it was done through the rapid revolving of a copper cylinder against a circular brush composed of fine steel wires.

Supposing then that electricity and vibrations are one and the same why not make use of vibrations in their varying degrees as vibrations, in a practical sense? This thought seems practical when realizing that all things in nature—throughout the Universe—have their different rates of vibration—and going further, could we not say that all things created are made up of solidified, or condensed, vibrations?

Soon after the thought that electricity is composed of highly condensed vibrations came to my mind, one Sunday afternoon when listening quietly to a talk over the radio, sponsored by the Carnegie Institute, wherein the interrelationship of the earth, the things of the earth, the atmosphere, stratosphere, and the layer of electrified electrons above the stratosphere-beyond which sound does not travel—was explained, the thought came to me that the earth and these surrounding "layers" could be compared to an egg. #### Parable of the Mustard Seed

And he said, Whereunto shall we liken the kingdom of God? or with what comparison shall we compare it?

It is like a grain of mustard seed, which, when it is sown in the earth, is less than all the seeds that be in the earth:

But when it is sown, it groweth up, and becometh greater than all herbs, and shooteth out great branches; so

that the fowls of the air may lodge under the shadow of it.—Mark 4:30-32.

Generally speaking, "seed" symbolizes the power of God, which manifests throughout the universe. Within every human being is a spark of our divine Creator, and this "seed" has within itself the ability to grow and flower into a microcosmic "kingdom of God." No matter how small or undeveloped this "seed" may be, it has latent within itself all the potentialities of its Creator, and by proper cultivation becomes a wholly glorious manifestation of the spiritual attainment possible for all mankind.

The spirit within man is threefold, patterned in the image of its Creator, and its three aspects are designated as the divine spirit, the life spirit, and the human spirit. Man is also sevenfold and tenfold, having a threefold soul and a threefold body, connected with the spirit by the mind. During its pilgrimage into matter, the divine spirit aspect emanates from itself the dense body, extracting as pabulum the conscious soul. Similarly the life spirit radiates from itself the vital body, and extracts as food the intellectual soul; and the human spirit brings into being the desire body and extracts therefrom the emotional soul.

### Ambition and Astrology

THEN the king commanded, and they brought Daniel, and cast him into the den of lions. . . . [The next day] . . . the king arose very early in the morning, and went in haste to the den of lions, and the king spake to Daniel... Is thy God, whom thou servest continually, able to deliver thee from the lions? Then said Daniel,... My God hath sent his angel, and hath shut the lions' mouths, that they have not hurt me: forasmuch as innocency was found in me; and also before thee, O king, have I done no hurt. (Daniel 6: 16, 20, 22.)

Astrologically, ambition is indicated by the position and aspects of the Sun and the sign Leo, the Lion, ruled by that fiery Center, who when He rises shines alone. The lion is the king of beasts. When he roars fear strikes the heart of all those animals not endowed with exceptional courage. He dominates his environment by his loud roar and disposition to tear apart and devour those who stand in his way.

Thus the story of Daniel is seen to be an astrological allegory teaching the consequences of worldly ambition. When the King, the Will, listens to the false guidance of the lower mind (the lords), then the rational principle in man must descend into the destructive passions of the lower nature—the lion's den. It is then only delivered from being torn to pieces by maintaining a harmless attitude in the presence of the utmost provocation.

The birth of Samson was announced to Manoah's wife by an Angel. The Angel said unto her: disippear and the lave

Behold thou shalt conceive, and bear a son; and now drink no wine or strong drink, neither eat any unclean thing: for the child shall be a Nazarite unto God from the womb to the day of his death. . . .

[And when he was a young man]... Then went Samson down, and his father and his mother, to the vineyards of Timnath; and behold, a young lion roared against him.

And the Spirit of the Lord came mightily

upon him, and he rent him as he would have rent a kid, and he had nothing in his hand: but he told not his father or his mother what

he had done. . . . And as he returned that way he turned aside to see the carcase of the Lion: and behold, There was a swarm of bees and honey in the carcase of the lion.

And he took thereof in his hands and went on eating, and came to his father and mother and gave them to eat: but he told them not that he had taken the honey out of the carcase of the lion. . . .

And Samson put forth a riddle: Out of the eater came forth meat; and out of the strong came forth sweetness. And they could not in three days expound the riddle. (Judges, 13, 14.)

Here again the passionate desire of the heart to dominate is slain by the wisdom of the illumined mind, Samson; and the fruit of this victory is the sweetness of honey in the carcass of the Lion. Here again the Bible teaches by means of astrological allegory that ambition, as the word is ordinarily used, is destructive and must be overcome before spiritual progress can be made.

Brutus killed Julius Caesar by stabbing him in the back in a public place. In the Shakespearean play Anthony makes the well-known burial speech:

I come to bury Caesar, not to praise him.

The noble Brutus hath told you Caesar is ambitious;

ambitious;
If it were so, It was a grievous fault,
And grievously hath Caesar answer'd it.

He [Caesar] was my friend, faithful and just to me:

But Brutus says he was ambitious.

Here we see the ambition in action which is torn to pieces in the Lion's Den because the desire for power was greater than the desire to serve. This well represents the fate to this type of ambition.

Macbeth represents another type of ambition where the man is the tool of the secret ambition of a woman. Lady Macbeth says, as the play opens: "Thou (Macbeth) wouldst be great, art not without Ambition, but without the illness should attend it."

Thus the Bible and Shakespeare's plays point out in the most forceful way the danger of the love of power, the desire to dominate. Ambition has personal advancement or preferment as its end and aim. Generally advancement means becoming conspicuous in life as John Ruskin points out in "Sesame and Lillies": It means "obtaining a position which shall be acknowledged by others to be respectable or honorable. We do not understand by this advancement the mere making of money, but the being SEEN to have made it; not the accomplishment of any great aim but the being SEEN to have accomplished it. In a word it is the gratification of our thirst for applause." That thirst is, as Mr. Ruskin says, the last infirmity of noble minds, and the first infirmity of weak ones; and is on the whole the strongest impulse of the average humanity.

When the Sun rises in the morning the stars fade and he shines alone. So it is with the earth life. When the Ego descends into the dark caves of the dense body the consciousness becomes focused in the dense world and the spiritual life fades. Ordinary humanity have not evolved the strength of Samson, nor the wisdom and self restraint of Daniel; they admire Caesar; or they obey Macbeth through fear.

The philosophy of astrolgical symbolism also gives the key to the ambitious bent of the twelve tribes of Israel, the children of the twelve signs; and this is indicated by the sign the Sun was in at the time of birth, and by the planets in Leo. Both the worldly ambition and the ideal toward which slow evolutionary progress is directed is shown by Leo and the Sun in the natal chart.



The most ambitious of all the groups is that with the Sun in Aries. The Sun is exalted in Aries, which would

indicate the desire of the heart to dominate, to lead, to be the head, Aries. In their martial impatience to attain that ardently longed-for end they very often ride rough-shod over the rights and feelings of their more meek and less aggressive fellow creatures. Though blunt to the point of cruelty in getting their own way they nevertheless bring the light of knowledge to bear upon the problems of life. They are bound to have great respect for Position, and the Reputation for Erudition.

The union of the heart and head through the illumination of the Spiritual Sun is the ideal for this group, and when the Lion and the Lamb lie down together there is experienced the Peace of Christ which passeth understanding.



Ambition for money power would be the natural bent for those with the Sun in Taurus. This earthy, fixed

sign often shows a mind fixed on earthly treasure — especially desirous of the power over the labor of others which money represents. Preferment would be sought more for the income it would bring than for position, learning, skill, or fame. However, there would be expected an attraction to the fame attached to the power of oratory.

The ideals for this group are the wise use of the power of money; and the wise use of the power of the spoken word. By the justice of the heart's judgment in regard to the use of money inequity will disappear and the lovely Venus can safely bring Beauty into the life: and by the proper use of The Word the sick are healed, and the ignorant enlightened.



With the Sun in Gemini the ambition is for knowledge. Knowledge must be obtained, not only for the power

inherent within it, but for the gratification of inquisitiveness, and the love of analysis. These people are likely to become the victims of a cold intellectual pride which shuts out the affection which brothers and sisters should have for each other.

The ideal for which this group should strive is the marriage of true minds represented by the joined hands of the twins:

Let me not to the marriage of true minds Admit impediments. Love is not love Which alters when it alteration finds, Or bends with the remover to remove: O, no! it is an ever-fixed mark, That looks on tempests and is never shaken.

According to the Rosicrucian Philosophy the World of Thought is the Heaven World to man in his present state of development so that the joined hands of the twins points to the ideal of brotherhood that looks on passionate outbursts unshaken as Shakespeare's sonnet so accurately expresses it. The joined hands may also represent the union of the right and left cerebral hemispheres in the individual with all thereby implied. It will be remembered that the Sun rules the bridge (Pons).



Success to the people with the Sun in Cancer would be expected to be measured in such domestic terms as: what

kind of parents do they make? what kind of a table do they set? To live in an exclusive neighborhod with harmonious surroundings would be a natural ambition for the Sun-in-Cancer natives for they love quiet, and to be away from the noise and confusion of commercial life.

The blending of Fire and Water is the ideal for this group. At the marriage at Cana of Galilee the Water of Life (emotion) is changed by the addition of the Wisdom principle (the fire) into wine, Divine Love.



The ambition is for position and power when the Sun is in his own sign Leo. The king of beasts demands, and

very often gets power without counting the cost. These people often attain their ends by the skill with which they play upon the heart strings of those they consider their inferiors. The position and power of the teacher who can successfully appeal to the heart of the pupil is great indeed because only in this way are the emotional drive to action, and the intellectual enlightenment combined. Sun-in-Leo might naturally be expected to delight in teaching.

The ideals for this group are indicated in the Bible stories of Samson and Daniel. So I may pay the debt I owe by diffusing living light.



## A Tot Hastened Into Motherhood

CHICAGO, Aug. 7 (U.P.)—Lina Medina, Peruvian girl who gave birth to a son last year when only 5 years old, will be brought to the United States within a month for examination by a five-man medical commis-

Richard S. Kaplan, counsel for business men in Chicago and Peru who are sponsoring the child's trip by airplane, made the announcement tonight. He said the medical commission was being organized to study the girl and her baby at a Chicago hospital. The public will not be permitted to see them.

"We want to give physicians and scientists in this country a chance to examine Lina, because it may contribute something valuable to medical science as it already has contributed to medical history" Kaplan said. "They will arrive within a month, probably before Sept. 1."

Mr. Kaplan said the young mother and her son would be accompanied by her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Tiburcio Medina, nurses and a physician.

The important part which the ductless glands play in the development of man is almost beyond comprehension. Each of these glands produces a secretion the power and potency of which has only of late years been studied, and the function of the various secretions discovered. All of the ductless glands work in harmony, but each has its own special task to perform.

The adrenal glands have a very close relation to the organs of reproduction and also to the mind. So closely are they all related that in the case of certain disturbances which cause these glands to supply a massive dose of their secretion to the blood, peculiar mental and sex phenomena, and other irregularities are produced. A disturbance of these glands may occur before or after birth. If the disturbance involving the glands occurs after the birth of the child the symmetrical correspondence and harmony of

the primary sex organs and secondary sex characteristics are not affected; but there does follow an unusual hastening of the development of the body and the mind which results in a precocious puberty most startling in its effects. A little girl as young as two, three, or four years of age will suddenly exhibit the appearance of one who is fourteen or fifteen with all the developments of one of that age. She is, so far as sex and mentality are concerned, really a developed young woman, although she may for a short period retain her liking for childish amusement. A similar phenomenon may happen to a boy in case his adrenals for any particular reason become excited into over activity; and at a very tender age such a boy could become a father.

If the story as printed in several publications is true, which is really possible, it is quite evident that for some physiological reason over-stimulation of the adrenals took place early in Lina Medina, hastening puberty, and so she was able to give birth to a child at the early age recorded in various newspapers throughout the country.

#### Vehicles and Organs, Old and New

It has often been stressed by members of the medical profession that human beings are gradually losing their toes, and quite recently a London doctor gave it as his opinion that our toes will eventually disappear altogether.

The big toe, which assists us in walking, is the only toe of any real use, and it is probable that with the passing of time this, too, will have a tendency to bunch up with the other digits through years of confinement in shoe leather.

We each have more than 90 organs, muscles and bones which are entirely obsolete and useless to us. They are physical reminders of the years when man presented an appearance greatly different from that of today.

Some people can twitch their ears backward and forward but they are the exception rather than the rule. In their cases the muscle for the purpose is unusually developed. We all have it, but it has become so weak through centuries of disuse that it survives only as a memento of the time when human beings twitched their ears forward like horses or dogs to catch the faintest sound.

Another heritage from our prehistoric ancestry is the possession of an extra eyelid. Few of us know we have it, but it is in the corner of every eye between the ball and the lid—a tiny fold of membrane. This is a relic of the winking membrane present in many mammals and nearly all birds. It is used for dusting the eyeball, and you have only to see the eagle as he flickers a gray film over his eye to know what a human eye probably was like millions of years ago.

The appendix is by far the best known obsolete portion of our body, and this is probably because it shows its uselessness by causing a great deal of trouble when irritated. Here again is an obvious heritage of the days when we were more humble mammals, for the appendix is the largest and most vital organ in the rabbit. It is significant also that the anthropoid apes have a distinct appendix which is lacking in other monkeys.

And we have gills—all of us, denoting probable descent from some remote water-breathing ancestor. The one which remains with us through life is in the form of the Eustachian tube, which connects the ear passage with the back of the mouth.—Los Angeles Examiner, June 25, 1940.

It is interesting to see our newspapers printing articles like the above, for it shows what rapid strides our material scientists are taking on the road which leads to truth. Almost every day some publication prints an article which thirty or forty years ago would have been considered too absurd to waste the time and space it would require to present it to the public. Now, however, it begins to look as though it will not be long before these scientists will discover and begin to bring forth proof that involution and evolution are facts incorporated into the great scheme of creation.

Quite true it is that man has organs which he used in the past, but which have become quite unnecessary at the present stage of his evolution; at the present time he also has organs that he did not have in the past—the lungs for example. In the future he will have still other organs and a vehicle as well, which he does not now possess. Man's physical body and the organs within it have all been evolved as each was needed in order to further his evolutionary development, and when each has served its purpose in the evolutionary scheme, it gradually becomes useless, atrophies, and finally disappears.

The lungs were the last important organ evolved. They took the place of the gill cleft mentioned in the quoted article. The time is coming, however, when man will no longer need a physical body at all, for he is destined to function in a much rarer substance. He will therefore need a vehicle which will be suited to his changed environment. Consequently he is now preparing this new instrument, which is composed of light and reflecting ethers. At the present time the most of mankind is working on this new body automatically, similarly to the way they worked when developing their lungs, but there are those in the vanguard of evolution who are doing this work consciously and accordingly they are making quite rapid progress.

The material scientist has already discovered that there is really such a substance as ether. The occult scientist knows that ether exists in four different states of density, which he calls chemical. life, light, and reflecting ether, respectively. It is of the two last named ethers that man's new vehicle is being fashioned This vehicle has the power of levitation. and when completed, man will be able to travel in it wherever he desires with no other propelling power than his own individual will, which he now uses in moving his physical body from place to place. In the Bible Paul speaks of this vehicle in First Corinthians 15:44, where it is called "a natural body." The Greek words used by Paul and translated "natural body" were Soma Psuchicon. Soma means body and psuche means soul; so combining the two words we have soul body, which is the name of this new vehicle, maint the soft-inforperror heirten.

#### Overcoming Death

Question:

There are certain metaphysical schools which teach it is possible to overcome death while still in the physical body. What does the Western Wisdom School teach on this subject?

Answer:

The Western Wisdom School does not teach that death will ever be overcome while the individual is still inhabiting a physical body and continuing to live in it. This school does teach, however, that man will conquer that which is now called death, but this will take place through the perfecting of his soul body and not his physical vehicle.

The vital body is composed of four ethers, namely: chemical, life, light, and reflecting. The chemical ether works with the assimilation of food and the excretion of physical body waste matter. The life ether is concerned with the perpetuation of the dense body of the various life waves. The light ether generates blood heat and manifests the functions of sight, hearing, tasting, smelling, and feeling. The reflecting ether is the seat of memory, and contains one of the records in the Memory of Nature.

Through loving, self-forgetting service to others it is possible to automatically attract and separate the light and reflecting ethers from the chemical and life ethers and to build these two higher ethers into a new vehicle, the soul body, in which at some future time man will function, much in the same way as he now functions in his dense body. It is this soul body which is not subject to physical death.

In the Sixth Epoch of the Earth Period the soul body will be so well per-

fected that man will function in it as easily as he now functions in his physical body. This does not mean, however, that man in the Sixth Epoch will not possess a physical body, because the field of operation will still be the physical world. The man at that time will still possess a physical body, which will be sloughed off from time to time and a new one acquired; but his consciousness will be continuous both on the etheric and physical planes because he will then possess both physical and etheric vision. Therefore at this time man will have conquered death by virtue of the fact that his consciousness will have become continuous, although his physical body will still be subject to death. At a later stage in man's evolution, known as the Jupiter Period, the physical body will be entirely discarded, and he will then of course carry on the process of conquering death in a still higher stage of evolution.

#### GROUP SPIRITS AND ANIMAL CHARGES

Question:

I read in your literature that each species of animal is under the direction of a group spirit. What are these group spirits, and how do they direct their charges?

Answer:

Group spirits are archangels, and there is one for each species of animal. The habits, tastes, likes, and dislikes of each group are due to the fact that they are actuated by the same group spirit. Consequently, if we know the habits of one animal of a certain species we know the habits of all the animals belonging to that particular family or group.

All animals and man are attached to their various vehicles by means of the silver cord. The first part of the silver cord is composed of ether and starts from the apex of the left ventricle of the heart. From there it goes to the solar plexus where it meets the second part, which originates in the liver and is composed of desire stuff. The third part of the cord is composed of mind stuff and originates in the mind substance surrounding the seat of the ego in the frontal sinus. From there in the adult human being this mind stuff part of the cord goes to the liver where it connects with the desire substance part of the cord. In children the second and third parts of the cord are not connected until about the twenty-first year. In animals the third part of the silver cord is connected with the group spirit, and by means of this elastic bond the group spirit governs the animals belonging to its species with equal facility regardless of where they may be in the physical world. Distance is nonexistent from the viewpoint of the inner worlds, and as the animals have no mind of their own they unquestioningly obey the suggestions of their group spirit which reaches them by means of this third part of the silver cord. It is this group spirit direction that is called instinct in animals.

#### WHEN AND HOW TO PRESENT THE TEACHING

Question:

In the case of an individual who was reared in an orthodox church but who later became a student of the Western Wisdom teaching, would it be right for him to try to convince his former religious associates of the truth of the Western Wisdom teaching, or would it be best to leave these friends alone until such a time as they became dissatisfied with their own faith?

Answer:

It is the duty of every student who has accepted the Western Wisdom teaching

to make it available for those of his acquaintances whom he believes to be ready for it, but he should in no case engage in proselyting. The acceptance of esoteric teaching depends entirely upon the individual's having become sensitized to the vibrations of the spiritual planes, after which he is able to see the truth in teachings dealing with those planes. Previous to that he is more or less materialistic. and so, totally incapable of perceiving esoteric truths. Therefore to try to convince him only leads to futile arguments and frequently to needless strife. mankind as a whole is quite rapidly becoming sensitized, and there is every year an increasingly large number of people who have reached the point where they can accept the higher teaching. We, therefore, are seriously failing in our duty if we neglect to put this teaching where it may be contacted by those who are seeking.

It is our duty to present this teaching either by word or by our literature to those whom we believe to be seeking for light; then we may wait for them to take the second step. If they ask us for further information we may know that the seed has been sown in fertile soil, or at least in soil that is partially ready to bring forth. Placing our literature where it may be picked up by the public is a very good way to spread the message. In casual conversation, too, the opportunity often presents itself to drop a sentence which contains an esoteric suggestion. If among those present there are some who are seeking, they will sense the idea and indicate it in some way. after which one is at liberty to give them whatever information one feels that it is best to impart.

The very best way of all to give out this marvelous teaching is by the daily life we lead. People are very quick to note one's actions and sense something of the motives which activate them, and when they begin to make inquiries the way is open to present the truth which almost invariably is accepted.

## Vitamins for Vitality

NASMUCH as this is a discourse offered in the healing department portion of the convention

program. I have decided to make so practical what I have to say upon vitamins that you will remember some of it to take home with you to use in your menu-making, marketing, and cooking, for it is my belief that when we know more about the small beginnings of disease which lie in the deficiencies in nutrient essentials, we shall not only eat the optimum adequate diet ourselves but offer it to all those who may wish to carry the banner of health to others.

Vitamins are substances that occur in infinitesimally small quantities in food yet produce specific physiological effects in the body. Whenever there is a lack of one or more of these in the regular diet of an individual, sooner or later he exhibits the signs of that deficiency. First, there is an impairment of the function that vitamin was designed to stimulate, and then the lesser symptoms of disease begin to appear. In time we have an individual who presents the symptom-complex of such maladies as scurvy, beriberi, rickets, night blindness, pellagra, stunted growth, gastrointestinal dysfunction, and general debility. There are contributing dietetic factors in some of these conditions, as for instance in rickets where there is not only a deficiency in vitamin D but also a lack of, or an imbalance in, the proportionate amounts of calcium and phosphorus.

It was only about twenty-seven years ago that the first vitamin was isolated and through the years there have been only seven more discovered. These eight vitamins are definitely known to be necessary factors in man's nutrition. There are others that are valuable in animal husbandry but as yet they have not been proved to be necessary to the human body. Because their chemical composition was unknown, they were named by letters of the alphabet, A, B1, B2 (or G), C, D, E, Be, and K1. There was supposed to be another, named F, but two years later the discoverer learned that he had mistaken some reactions in his experiments and so vitamin F went into the discard. Then it was learned that vitamin B had more factors than vitamin G, which in England was always called vitamin B2, and later when the chemical formulae of the vitamins became known it was thought best to give to the B factors the names of their chemical equivalents, or thiamin for B1, riboflavin for B2, nicolinic acid for Bo. Vitamin Bo had been also called the anti-pellagric vitamin because it was found that this was an essential food factor in the cure of pellagra, that disease so common in our southern states. More than one hundred thousand cases are reported each year. Vitamin C has also a chemical equivalent, ascorbic acid.

We have spoken and still do speak of a deficiency in one vitamin as being the cause of a certain disease, but according to a well-known biochemist who sees hundreds of patients each year in consultation with physicians, vitamin deficiencies do not often occur singly. One may be the main cause, as a deficiency in vitamin C will cause scurvy, but an added deficiency in vitamin B may contribute in producing severer effects.

In some cities after traffic accidents, the participants are given tests for vision in places of faint illumination. A failure to see under these circumstances is due to a deficiency of vitamin A in the food. Sometimes this failure occurs after sudden exposure to a very bright light. The visual purple in the retina is deficient and the remedy for all this is adding foods to the diet that contain good amounts of vitamin A. I usually recommend fresh green leafy vegetables, dairy products, and yellow root vegetables like carrots. In some of these a pro-vitamin called carotene is found. In the body this pro-vitamin is changed to vitamin A. The research of the last five years has taught us that carotene is not absorbed in as great amount as vitamin A and the waste may be greater unless the right amount of bile is present and still more important is the fact that less than a required amount is stored in the liver when that organ is diseased. So now we must prepare the liver for the storage of vitamin A by giving what the biochemists are pleased to call saturation amounts of the other vitamins, especially vitamin C.

But night blindness is not the only ill effect of vitamin A deficiency. We know that atrophy of the epithelial cells which line the sinuses, the bronchial tubes, the pelvis of the kidneys, and other organs, is a very serious matter. Infants show the effects in diseases of the respiratory tract and if they have pneumonia, they recover very slowly and often have recur-

rences. In adults skin lesions may be a result of the deficiency. One new and interesting benefit has been brought to light, namely, that vitamin A in oil when applied to wounds in the superficial tissues brings about a more speedy recovery.

A lack of vitamin A in children retards the normal growth processes. Bone marrow is affected also, lessening the production of red blood cells; the functioning of the enamel-forming organs of the teeth is disturbed so that pits occur in the enamel which before long decay.*

Vitamin D like vitamin A is soluble in oil and the very best source of it is through exposure of unclad parts of the body to sunshine, which through its ultraviolet rays changes the sterol, or hard fat, in the skin, into pro-vitamin D, which through chemical processes in the body becomes one or another of the factors of vitamin D. Here is a practical point I wish to bring out and that is that he who expects to take a sun bath must not bathe his body with soap and water before he exposes it to the sun because the soap takes out the oil from the sebaceous glands and the material is depleted of which the pro-vitamin would be made. Bathing after the bath with water alone will not harm the chemical process.

Vitamin D deficiency is not only the cause of rickets but there is considerable evidence that it is a contributing cause of arthritis, psoriasis, in some cases of hay fever, in slow clotting of blood, and in the toxemia of pregnancy. Calciferol. the synthetic vitamin D2, is sold under the trade name of viosterol; it is curative but it should always be taken with calcium gluconate or calcium lactate with the advice of a physician or biochemist. Milk contains calcium lactate and if there is a good quantity of this drunk every day, there may be enough of the two elements, calcium and phosphorus, but usually there is need for an additional amount of calcium gluconate. There are people who seem to think that milk and calcium are needed only by infants and growing children but I know from personal experience that from birth to death

we need milk or its equivalent. When I speak of an equivalent, I am thinking of those persons who are allergic to milk. *

Vitamin E, which is also soluble in oil, is still called the antisterility vitamin although evidence that it is essential to human beings is negligible. It occurs in wheat germ oil but as it turns rancid very quickly, it would be better to eat the seeds in which it is found while they are fresh and take what we can from the yolks of eggs and green leafy vegetables. The most important late success with its use has been in cases of infantile paralysis after the acute condition is ended. The wasted muscles seem to have been helped when this is given with vitamin B-complex.*

Vitamins K₁, and K₂, called the antihemorrhagic vitamins, are also oil soluble in the natural state. The synthetic vitamin K has been prepared in a water solution that may be used hypodermically in newborn babes and the aged who are threatened with serious bleeding from obstructive jaundice. Many lives have been saved by this means. It was hoped that this vitamin would help overcome the disease called hemophilia but no evidence has been produced to warrant this expectation. *

In concluding the discussion of the oil soluble vitamins, I may pause to speak of the famine effects in a large part of the world today. The last war showed how much the lack of the oil soluble vitamins did in positive harm to the peoples of Europe, the children born during the war, the nursing and expectant mothers, and the unborn babes. If I say to you there is at present in the United States of America a famine, you may be surprised. This famine is a chronic one and it is not due to a failure to get large amounts of food but because the foods that people buy the most of do not contain large amounts of the vitamins and mineral elements which are necessary to maintain health and promote vitality in the living human being.

There are two reasons why we have a famine among us and the first I just men-

tioned. The second reason is that poor cooking causes so much loss of valuable nutrients that I wish every man and woman who has a job that requires cooking would learn of the nutritionists how food should be prepared to give our people the best that is possible at the least expense. This kind of a famine doesn't kill human beings but it does keep them ailing, miserable, and unfit for work.

* The foods in which vitamin A occurs in good percentage are: Broccoli leaves, dandelion greens, alfalfa meal, chard, kale, escarole, parsley, fresh Hubbard squash, red peppers, Chinese cabbage, carrots, green garden lettuce, butter, sweet potato, milk, egg yolks, broccoli flowers, banana, whole eggs, yellow peaches, apricots, cheese, and summer squash.

Vitamin D is found in exposure to sunshine, in irradiated milk and vegetables, egg yolk, cream, cheddar cheese.

Vitamin E may be obtained in the oils from the seeds of wheat, rice, corn, and cotton, in leafy vegetables, vegetable fats, butter fat, and eggs.

Vitamin K occurs in cabbage, cauliflower, kale, egg yolk, soy bean oil, tomatoes, and spinach.


The beginners' astrology class is planned for Tuesday evenings and will be taught by Mr. John Reid. The advanced class will be announced later.



contact to the earth for the human machine. For several years I have been interested especially in noting my own reactions to various kinds of music, and when standing on a street listening to a band I can feel the vibrations of the music come from the earth through my feet and reverberate through my whole being. I have noted also that the vibrations of music can be felt from the floors of buildings wherein music is played. causes me to wonder if humanity as a whole is not affected more than we realize by chaotic vibrations rebounding from the layer of electrified electrons to the earth—the earth being the floor of the globe, or egg, wherein we live.

Accepting this as a possibility, could we not then influence the people of the earth constructively, instead of destructively, through conscious use of radio vibrations? I believe we can since I believe that all things which can be used destructively can be used constructively. This would be done if men were but aware of the great possibility of destroying negative, chaotic, world-wide conditions by controlling sound vibrations sent out through mechanical means.

How could it be done? Could it not be done through the use of music with highly spiritual vibrations sent forth from a radio broadcasting station centrally placed?—the program to be picked up gradually by surrounding broadcasting stations until all broadcasting stations in this country would be carrying the same program.

This idea might be difficult to execute due to the fact that radio programs are commercialized, but if this could be brought about eventually would not most of the negative, chaotic conditions of the earth be eliminated? This may be considered by some as something of a dream or vision but I feel that some day, not far distant, something of this kind will be used, from a strictly scientific standpoint, and that man will eventually be able to govern the elements through harnessing vibrations and using them consciously, as he wills.

It is my belief that men highly trained scientifically in radio activity can work with sound effects and tones, which, when projected, will accomplish many things of great benefit to mankind, mentally, physically, spiritually. Man is now using this great force as thoughtlessly as a child using a dangerous toy.
