[FROM THE ROSICRUCIAN VIEWPOINT]

Prostrate France-- An Object Lesson

Since the French Revolution, which began in 1789, this has been the slogan of France and free Frenchmen everywhere. Their present plight is sad and represents the apparent collapse of their ideals. France has been a republic during the greater part of the time since the Revolution and one of the leading exponents of democracy in the world. But due to her collapse in June, 1940, she has temporarily ceased to be a member of the democracies of the

FRANCE world. She is no longer free France, although a portion of the French colonial empire is still relatively free, and General

De Gaulle has assumed leadership of a large free French group.

The relations between the French and American republics have in general always been cordial. Just now, however, there is a slight riff in that cordiality. Within the last few days President Roosevelt has addressed a strong protest to the Vichy government, under General Petain, against further surrender of France to the Nazis and the turning of her resources over to them for possible use against her former ally. The President doubtless felt that the situation was very critical, otherwise he would not have addressed so drastic a note to Vichy.

Petain's reply to this, as quoted in the Los Angeles Times, was:

"France must today turn to her conqueror, Germany, and participate in the reorganization of Europe in order to keep her position as a great power, her integrity, her territory and her empire and has a right to negotiate with Hitler on these matters."

France has a most interesting history. The original French, the Franks, were a Teuton people of Indo-Aryan speech who settled in ancient Gaul in prehistoric times. They were a part of the fifth Aryan Race, of which the Anglo-Saxons and the Teutonic Germans are the outstanding members today. Caesar conquered Gaul about 50 B.C. as recorded in his Commentaries. Then around 800 A.D., under Charlemagne, there was a considerable amalgamation of the Franks with the Roman Latins and the Germanic Teutons so that today the French are to some extent a mixed race people. The emotional Latin temperament of the third Aryan Race is quite pronounced in them.

France is Catholic to a greater degree than Protestant. French religious history centers around the

HIGH LIGHTS great Notre Dame Cathedral in Paris, which traditionally has been the place of the coronation

of French kings throughout the centuries. But basically France has a truly independent spirit, and is not slavishly under the domination of the Roman Church.

In the matter of history we must not forget the French-Norman invasion of England in 1066 under William the Conqueror, with its subsequent profound influence upon the English national character and government. The Frenchmen carried many of their cultural and economic ideas into Anglo-Saxon Eng-

land, which speeded up English evolution materially, and was a large factor in making England the melting pot of Europe after the Middle Ages. The independence of the French spirit was demonstrated forcibly in the French Revolution in which Queen Marie Antoinette lost her head-literally. Her most famous sentence, when protests were made to her that the French people had no bread to eat, was: "Let them eat cake." The queen was not hard-hearted as this might seem to indicate, but it was a similar spirit that brought on the Revolution against the unfeeling governing classes and made possible the beginnings of French Democracy.

About this time Napoleon flashed across the political sky of Europe like a comet, beginning his meteoric career some time before the Revolution, and continuing it until Waterloo in 1815. His end was like that of a comet, or the end which comets will eventually reach—he came down like a stick. Thus was his great threat to democracy broken up, militarism was given a setback, and his project of invading Britain was never realized. Fifty-five years later, the Franco-Prussian War, initiated by Bismarck, burst upon an unprepared

France, and a period of national humiliation and hardship began. The French, however, recovered from this compara-

tively quickly. French history was more or less quiet until the advent of the World War in 1914. That was the beginning of the change of everything, an influence which is still in operation. The Treaty of Versailles which was to end war has failed to realize its purpose.

Freemasonry has always been strong in France until August of last year, when under orders of the Nazi command it was outlawed by a decree of the Vichy government. Thus France, under duress, has followed the lead of Germany, Italy, Spain, and Russia. Freemasonry, as we have said before in this column, is the philosophy and religion of the Sons of Cain, the more creative branch of the hu-

man race. Rosicrucianism is Esoteric Masonry, the part of Masonry which modern Masons have forgotten. It is unfortunate that Freemasonry has received this setback in France because Esoteric Masonry, namely, Rosicrucian Christianity, is destined to be the universal gospel of the coming Aquarian Age. Every such setback delays to some extent the coming of that Age.

France has made great contributions through the years to the cause of culture and civilization. Among her scientists, Curie, the discoverer of radium, and Pasteur, in bacteriology, were outstanding. Her literary men have been many and versatile, Victor Hugo being one of the best known to English readers. Voltaire, the great French philosopher, was

a noted champion of hu-Voltaire man liberty. His creed CHAMPION was aptly expressed in one of Liberty of his remarks: "I don't believe in anything you

are saying, but I will defend to the death your right to say it." In the field of art France has always been a leader, and the Ecole de Beau Arts in Paris has been the training school of large numbers of American artists.

A new book entitled, France, My Country, by Jacques Maritain, French philosopher and lecturer at American universities on the political and social conditions that led to the French disaster, has recently appeared. We quote from a review in News-Week:

"Dr. Maritain believes that if Nazi domination should become established over Europe, France would need a century or two to surmount its state of slavery. On the other hand, his belief in his countrymen stirs the hope that a Free France will emerge much sooner."

The French have always been good colonizers, running second only to the English in this field. Their colonizing ability is attested by their great colonial empire in French Indo-China, North Africa, Dakar on the African West Coast, and French Guiana and Martinique in the Western Hemisphere.

Bureaucracy and graft, however, have been on the increase in France in late years. These things are the present-day curse of democratic government everywhere, due to the undeveloped character of the Egos who are now incarnating on the earth. This phase of political government, however, will disappear in due time after the necessary evolution, and the Aquarian democracy which is coming will be free from them. The prevalence of such things doesn't mean that the people living in democracies are of a lower standard of character than those living under dictatorial governments, but merely that there are many more opportunities in a democracy for grafting than under governments where the people are held down more tightly.

The French are to a considerable degree a nation of epicures, and French chefs have been famous in all times for devising rare dishes. In the matter of the relations between the sexes the French have always been much more unconventional than Anglo-Saxon standards endorse. Generally speaking, the French have refused to discipline themselves voluntarily, and now they are having involuntary discipline imposed upon them by others.

The French "Popular Front" government, in force during the last few years, is credited with

FRENCH having created many of the conditions which led FRONT' GOVT. to the collapse of France.

Democracy is a difficult

proposition to manage because so many people have a finger in the pie and so many have to be consulted in the making of vital decisions. The Popular Front made great efforts to bring better living conditions to the masses of the people, but it was infested with devastating strikes, favoritism and inefficiency, with the result that France was unprepared to defend herself against the smashing blows of the war machine. In this respect she is an object lesson and a warning to America. However, America has a world destiny and will eventually find her way successfully through the maze of national and international complications, although she has much to learn before she will be able to make the great success of democracy of which she is capable.

From the esoteric standpoint universal democracy is the coming world order for it is founded upon the evolutionary freedom of the human will. Therefore dictatorships in all parts of the world at all times, founded on force and the denial of the freedom of the will, are opposed to the forward trend of Evolution. Hence we know from this one esoteric fact alone that they are eventually doomed, although they may hang on for a long time.

The Rosicrucians proclaim there is a divine plan and pattern according to which all human affairs and the affairs of human governments are being worked out, and which unconsciously they are following. During the last half century

mankind has become too

CORRUPTION materialistic and has not
been making the necessary

NEW AGE progress toward the Aquarian ideal of unselfish co-

operation of all for the common good. There has been too much grasping for personal advantage in both high and low places, and wide-spread disregard of the common good just so the individual was served. Such obstacles must be cleared out before the New Age can be ushered in. When mankind does this voluntarily the world moves along smoothly, but when it refuses to make a reasonable degree of voluntary progress, then the Directors of Evolution make use of man's own evil creations to destroy those elements which are blocking the coming ideals, and war results.

"Karma, viz., cause and effect, is the perfect teacher," and this esoteric aphorism applies to nations as well as individuals. When the nations have learned their karmic lesson, strife and war will pass away. Individual graft and national aggrandizement will be equally repugnant to the citizens of the New Age, voluntarily abandoned. Then and then only will the realization of the divinely destined regime of Brotherhood and Universal Friendship be possible.



From Law to Faith

ther we go back in time, the more primitive the race, the more crude is also its religion. As man advances, so do his religious ideas. Materialistic investigators draw from these facts the conclusion that all religions are man-made, that all conceptions of God are rooted in human imagination. The fallacy of that idea is readily seen when we consider the tendency of all that lives toward self-preservation. Where only the law of the survival of the fittest governs, as it does among the animals, where might is right, there is no religion. Not until a higher extraneous power makes itself felt can that law be abrogated and the law of self-abnegation come into play as a factor of life, as it does in a small measure in even the most crude religion. Huxley recognized that fact in his last lecture, where he pointed out that while the Law of the survival of the fittest marks the animals' line of progression. the law of sacrifice is the heart of human advancement, impelling the strong to care for the weak, giving gladly what they might easily withhold, yet growing by such giving.

The reason for this anomaly cannot be

found by the materialist; from his view-point it must ever remain an insoluble riddle, but once we understand that man is a composite being: spirit, soul, and body, that spirit expresses itself in thought, soul in feeling, and body in action, and that this threefold man is an image of the triune God, we shall readily understand the seeming anomaly, for by his constitution such a composite being would be peculiarly fitted to respond to both spiritual vibrations and physical impacts.

When we see how little the majority care for the higher life today, we may infer that there must have been a time when man was nearly entirely callous to the spiritual vibrations in the universe. He sensed vaguely a higher power in nature and being then partially endowed with clairvoyance, he recognized the existence of powers not now perceived, though working as potently as ever.

Man was to be led for his future good, so in order to guide him aright and aid the higher nature in obtaining mastery over the lower nature, the personality, the latter was at first worked upon by Fear. To have given him a religion of Love, to have tried moral suasion would have been absolutely useless when the human Ego was in its earliest infantile stage and the animal nature of the lower personality was paramount. The God who is to help such a humanity must be

When man had been brought a little further along he was taught to look to God also as The Giver of all, he was imbued with the idea that if he followed the Laws of this God material prosperity would follow. Disobedience on the other hand resulted in famine, war, and pestilence. In order to lead man up higher he must be taught the Law of Sacrifice, but at that stage man prized material possessions highly, and therefore he was prompted to sacrifice his sheep and oxen through faith in the promise that "the Lord will repay an hundredfold," that he who gives to the poor lends to the Lord, who always returns abundantly. There was then no promise of a heaven; that was yet beyond man's capacity of appreciation. It was emphatically stated that "Heaven, even the heavens are the Lord's: but the Earth hath He given to the children of men." (Ps. 115:16.)

Next, man is taught to sacrifice himself for a future reward in heaven. Instead of performing an occasional act of sacrificing a material possession, a bull or a sheep which the Lord quickly restores, it was now required that he should give up his evil desires and by "continuance in well-doing" "lay up treasure in heaven," carrying nothing for material possessions which thieves may steal or moth and rust corrupt.

Almost anyone may for a short time work himself up to a pitch of exaltation where it is easy to lay down all in one supreme act of renunciation, it is comparatively easy to die for one's faith, as in martyrdom, but that is not enough; the Christian Religion requires of us the courage to live our faith from day to day all through life by faith in a future reward in a heaven which is but very dimly adumbrated. Truly, the labors of Hercules seem small in comparison, and what wonder if doubts come to weigh us down with a burden like that of Atlas, robbing us of faith in the beneficent, all-sustaining power of God. . . .

Faith is the force in man which opens

up the channel of communication with God and brings us into touch with his Life and Power. Doubt, on the other hand, has a most withering and blighting influence on the spiritual life. That such are the effects of faith and doubt can easily be seen by examining their influence in our daily life. We know how expressions of faith and trust buoy us up and how depressing is the effect on us when we are doubted by others. The same holds good in the higher realms. . . .

The childlike attitude is particularly conducive to the acquisition of the knowledge which is symbolically spoken of as the Kingdom of God, in contradistinction to that ignorance which is the estate of man. Let it be clearly understood that the faith which is required is not a blind faith, nor an unreasoning faith which clings to a creed or dogma contrary to reason, but an open and unbiased state of the mind which is ready to entertain any proposition until thorough investigation has proven it untenable.

Prayer is an opening up of a channel along which the divine Life and Light may flow into the spirit, in the same way that the turning of a switch opens the way for the electric current to flow from the power-house into our house. Faith in prayer is like the energy which turns the switch. Without muscular force we can not turn the switch to obtain physical light, and without faith we cannot pray in such a manner as to secure spiritual illumination. If we pray for worldly ends, for that which is contrary to the law of love and universal good our prayers will prove as unavailable as a glass switch in an electrical circuit. Glass is a non-conductor, a bar to the electric power, and selfish prayers are, likewise, bars to divine purposes and must therefore remain unanswered. To pray to a purpose we must pray aright, and in The Lord's Prayer we have a most wonderful pattern, for it caters to the needs of man as no other formula could do. Within a few short sentences it encompasses all the complexities of the relationship of God to man.

Babel

HE legend of the Tower of Babel takes up such a small space in the Book of books and seems of

little significance, consequently it is passed over by many; some believing it a myth. Whether a myth or actual fact is not important to us. The lesson such a story holds for us; the kernel of truth is our concern today. Several gems of value are to be found in this tale; one especially in keeping with the Aquarian Age we are now preparing for.

This man-made pile was supposed to have been erected about 4248 B.C. on the cusp of the Taurian dispensation; that is, when new teachings were about to be ushered into the consciousness of the humanity living at that time.

We are again approaching changes and advancement; adjustments and adaptations are now being clearly marked for those who are alert to them. The first square to this past Taurian Age is soon to be felt, is already being noticed by those sensitive enough to respond to it. The square is a stormy aspect, calling for action and often drastic measures.

The people of old misinterpreted the signs of their times and we of today are in like danger of mistaking the guideposts along our path of life. These ancient ones of course read in the light of the coming age, as we believe we are doing, expecting some trouble to be of a physical nature dealing with the material element water (Scorpio), the complement of Taurus, among other fears they embraced (Fixed Cross). They were going to save themselves, because they knew in advance; their precautions would keep them high and dry. They planned a safeguard of stupendous magnitude; it was not only to shelter them from storms and protect them from the deluge; but, they reasoned, why not, while they were about it continue building until they reached heaven? Cooperation was their keyword: one ideal, one goal; all doing their part, and working harmoniously with their team mates. This co-operation with one another indicates that the Venusian influence had already begun to make itself felt; an important step toward the unity which we of the Piscean Age are striving for. Their choice of location is significant. Babel-on means the "Gateway of the Gods." A fitting place for their venture.

As long as harmony existed, all of one accord working for the big issue, each taking care of duties allotted him, everything went well. The seventh story was completed: seven outlooks, seven planets, messengers of wisdom bringing knowledge of Divine Law. Why not use this knowledge for self? Individual desires began to assert themselves, selfish aims clamored for recognition. Newly acquired abilities, earned and developed during this sevenfold creation were expended upon self. The eighth story barely started. Were they almost ready to respond to the vibrations of another planet? Noteworthy also is the significant symbol of four degrees for each story. Babylon is as you know in thirtytwo degrees North Latitude. The tipping of the earth's poles and the position of the equinoxes are determined if Babylon was the Greenwich of their day, establishing the time in the earth's history of its construction. The united effort necessary for the continuance of the cause became completely overshadowed by personal ambition.

Not much wonder God was "angry," although the heavenly powers were not to blame for the disaster that followed. The response these people made to the zodiacal and planetary vibrations and not the jealousy of God as has been often claimed, frustrated the plans for their Tower. Individual differences were the means of disruption, the drifting away

from each other caused the confusion and the scattering of the people to the four corners of the earth. That is, they expressed negatively the world cross they were entering, each choosing to travel alone and selfishly: emphasizing materialism (Taurus); exploiting egotism and power (Leo); choosing the dark side of things dealing with desire (Scorpio); and cultivating cunning, plus unrestrained freedom (Aquarius). Babel or confusion of course was the result; no one could understand the other fellow-they did indeed speak different languages. Working for and thinking of self alone, and disregard of the laws written in the sky always bring misunderstanding and bewilderment.

Let us see how we may apply this lesson to ourselves. We are all building a Tower within ourselves. Our pattern is our highest ideal; the goal, union with our higher self, the all-knowing Ego. No one is exempt. Every one is expected to be at work continually on his own tower, from the mightiest personage on

earth to the tiniest cog in the human kingdom. The problems we face are much the same as those of yestervear: and we are confronted with lessons of a similar nature, fixed and looming on our horizon. The threatened floods are the psychic elements and emotionalism, and the other dangers are the same as scattered the disconcerted people of old. These and various other factors plus scores of temptations tend to distract us from the vision of our true destiny. preventing us from centering and focusing our forces on the achievement of this destiny. We scatter our energies as desire and curiosity dictate, trying this, sampling that, and investigating something else till we ourselves are splendid examples of Babel. Our very mode of living might be named Babel.

Let us see how we may overcome these detriments; how we may line up our faculties so they will co-ordinate, harmonize, and become our partners instead of our masters. The main item to keep in mind is that we are striving to lift ourselves to the highest in us, to the higher self called by many the Silent The personality is trying to Watcher. become worthy to work and grow under the guidance of the Ego. It hopes to blend with it, become one with it and manifest the perfection which true spirit A valuble point to remember also is. is that this divine self is nearer than hands and feet; is with us at all times, ever ready and willing to send messages to aid us. Whether we listen or not, this service is perpetually available, seemingly silent because we have neglected training ourselves to hear it.

It fluttered around a bit, then came and rested before me on the remaining half of the curtain at the window.

A. No two atoms touch each other: there is an envelope of ether around each atom: all atoms in the universe float in an ocean of ether.

Q. Do the atoms of the World of Desire, of Thought, and the Higher Worlds interpenetrate the mineral?

Man's Debt to the Moon

HEN laggards inhabiting a Moon have retrieved their position and returned to the parent

planet; or, when continued retrogression has caused complete disintegration of their vehicles, the abandoned Moon also commences to dissolve. The momentum of a Spiritual impulse which propelled it in a fixed orbit for aeons, may endure for aeons after the Moon has been vacated, and from the physical point of view it may still seem to be a satellite of the planet it encircles. As the time goes on, however, and the power of attraction exercised by the parent planet diminishes, its orbit widens, until it reaches the limit of our solar system. It is then expelled into interstellar space; dissolved in Chaos."-The Rosicrucian Cosmo-Conception, page 260.

Of the nine planets which science places in our solar system our Earth has one satellite, Mars has two, Jupiter nine, Saturn ten (including the doubtful Themis), Uranus four, and Neptune one. No satellites have as yet been discovered belonging to Mercury, Venus, and Pluto.

Mars is a comparatively small planet possessing two small moons named Phobos (Flight) and Deimos (Fear); named after two of the five sons of the God of War, Mars; the former is about ten miles in diameter, and the latter

about five miles. They are the most extraordinary satellites in the whole of our solar system. Phobos encircles the parent planet three times a day remaining above the Martian horizon about four hours, rising in the west and setting in the east and changing its phases in this brief space of time, from full to new or new to full. Deimos behaves in quite a contrary manner to his brother Phobos and remains above the Martian horizon for about three days without setting, changing from new to full or full to new twice over.

Jupiter, the most brilliant object in the heavens, is the largest body of our planetary system except the Sun and is attended by nine satellites, which represent a miniature solar system. Of Jupiter's nine satellites four of them are always visible and may be seen with the help of a telescope under favorable conditions. A peculiar thing about Jupiter's satellites is that they never appear in the same relative positions; sometimes they are seen grouped closely together or at another time they are seen in a row across Jupiter's disc, or some may be seen to pass across the disc whilst another may be turning so as to vanish behind him. Ganymede, the largest of Jupiter's satellites, is half again the diameter of our Moon and larger than the planet Mercury; it is in fact the

largest satellite in our solar system and shows phases similar to our Moon. A Jupiterian therefore may always enjoy the spectacle of at least four bright moons at night. Incidentally, Jupiter's enormous gravitational mass has attracted a large number of comets from outer space, some fifty in number, diverting their paths so that they travel round it and the sun in the same direction as Jupiter and the other planets.

Saturn is roughly ten times as large as the Earth and seen through a telescope under favorable conditions is one of the most wonderful of celestial objects. Its magnificent series of rings is presumed to be the result of a shattered satellite which approached too close to the parent planet and was disrupted into millions of small particles forming a ring of debris around its primary. Astronomers tell us that a similar fate awaits Jupiter's innermost satellite which is approaching too close to the "danger zone" of the parent planet.

Uranus, a planet about four times the size of our Earth, possesses four satellites; and Neptune, similar in size to Uranus, has only one, named Triton, which is about the size of our Moon.

Regarding these satellites it is stated in The Roscirucian Cosmo-Conception:

When a planet has Moons it indicates that there are some beings in the life wave evolving on that planet who are too backward to share in the evolution of the main life wave, and they have therefore been set out from the planet to prevent them from hindering the progress of the pioneers. Such is the case with the beings inhabiting our Moon. In the case of Jupiter it is thought probable that the inhabitants of three of its moons will eventually be able to rejoin the life on the parent planet.

The further statement is made that it is thought that at least one of the others is an "Eighth Sphere," i.e., a field of disintegration, like our own Moon, where retrogression and disintegration result.

Satellite of the Earth

The Moon is the nearest celestial object and its mean distance from us is

238,857 miles. Its relative nearness, as compared with other celestial bodies, has made it one of the most closely studied of the celestial bodies. Its diameter is approximately two-sevenths that of the Earth whilst its surface area is approximately two twenty-sevenths or about thirteen and a half times smaller than the Earth; or roughly equal in area to North and South America.

Astrological Influence of the Moon

Very few pause to think of the disastrous consequences that would follow if our satellite suddenly went off on a tangent from its course.

Everything that happens on earth is influenced by the Moon and were it not for the latter, life in a physical body would be impossible. The Moon's influence is a real factor in evolution. It is known to influence all growth, counteracting that of the Sun.

On page 265 of The Rosicrucian Cosmo-Conception Max Heindel tells us:

The Moon forces reach man from the exact distance necessary to enable him to build a body of the proper density. But although the latter forces are active in the building of the form, they also cause death when their continued work finally crystallizes the tissues of the body.

The Sun works in the vital body and is the force which makes for life, and wars against the death dealing Moon force.

The Moon is known to exercise a peculiar power over the female organism, governing gestation, and is connected with the periods of inter-uterine life.

Referring to The Message of the Stars, Chapter XI, page 217:

According to astrology Cancer is the home of the Moon. The ancient Egyptians pictured this sign as a scarab or beetle which was their emblem of the soul and they called Cancer the sphere of the soul, for it is said that through this moist watery sign fertilized by the lunar ray the seed atoms are projected into the womb of the prospective parent who is thus prepared for the period of gestation; and occult science adds to this that the seed atoms of the animal kingdom, which is still mindless and therefore not amenable to lunar influences in that direction, are projected through the watery mar-

tial sign Scorpio while the seed atoms of the inert plants are poured in through the Jupiterian sign Pisces.

The Moon continues to exert its influence in septenary periods after birth. At seven years of age when the Moon has progressed square to its position at birth the Vital Body is born. At fourteen years of age when the Moon is in opposition to its position at birth the Desire Body is born, and at twenty-one years of age the Mind is born and the individual attains majority.

The Moon forces also express themselves in the imagination and it is well known that many mental diseases ("lunacy"), characterized by the individual's imagination being carried to excess and running riot, are attributed to the Moon.

Effect of the Moon on the Tides

The tides are produced by a combination of the gravitational effects of both the Sun and the Moon, but of these the Moon's is by far the greater. The highest tides occur when the Moon is new or full for then the action of the Sun is added and they act jointly. Our Moon therefore performs an important service to the waters of the sea and also the rivers flowing into them which also affects the rotation of the Earth.

The Moon as Time Keeper

Our months are measured by the Moon which takes approximately that length of time to encircle the Earth—or more exactly 27 days 7 hours 43 minutes 11 seconds known as the sidereal month. The "month" is a lunar time measure and from the earliest times has afforded a convenient gauge of time. The division of the month into "weeks" is also measured by the satellite's four phases.

In the beginning of our evolution the Moon was nearer to the Earth and bigger than it is now, hence the months and years were shorter which probably accounts for the seemingly great age to which people lived in far-off biblical times, but gradually it has retreated

from us becoming smaller in size. It is estimated that the Moon is being pushed away from the Earth five feet every century and the rotation of our planet is getting slower in consequence due to the tidal actions which act like a brake on the Earth's rotation. Tidal friction has lengthened the day from approximately three hours to twenty-four.

In our Religious Service Calendar the festival of Easter is dependent upon the lunar motions. We know that Easter cannot occur earlier than March 22nd or later than April 25th. Easter Sunday is the first Sunday after the full Moon which occurs upon or after the 21st day of March. If the full moon falls upon the Sunday then Easter Day is the Sunday following. Thus it follows that the moveable feasts advance or recede each year according to the date on which Easter occurs.

In the Islamic World the end of the Fast of Ramadan is determined by the first appearance of the Moon after the new moon.

The Full Moon which happens on or near the Autumn Quarter, about September 23rd, is called the Harvest Moon because it rises almost exactly at sunset for several nights after the Full, and is sufficiently bright for the harvesters to work well into the night—sometimes all night.

The Moon always presents the same face to the Earth because the Moon makes one complete turn on its axis while making its monthly journey round the Earth. Yet we see more than one-half of her surface due to a slight inclination of the axis to the plane of the path in which she travels round the Earth. We really see about four-sevenths of the whole area. Much speculation has been made as to the possible condition of the invisible side, which nobody has ever seen, but there is no reason to suppose that it is much different from the face we see.

The most powerful telescope brings the Moon to within a distance of about forty miles but too far for objects such as the size of an average building to be perceived-yet large cities would be observable if the Moon were inhabited by beings who build cities.

Early astronomers were of the opinion that with the invention of bigger and more powerful telescopes living beings or at least organic existence would be observable upon its surface. They considered the darker parts of the surface to be seas, similar to the oceans of the Earth, and the brighter parts land. However, since the advent of the modern telescope we learn that the satellite is devoid of air, water, and atmosphere, or vaporous surroundings suitable for the maintenance of life such as we know it. No clouds have ever been seen, though color has sometimes been observed upon her surface which might suggest some low form of vegetation; though this is difficult to reconcile with the lack of air and water.

Furthermore the Moon is a planet subject to torrid heat and intense cold, estimated at about 280° Fahrenheit at midday, whilst at midnight of the lunar night it cools down to about 140° below zero Fahrenheit.

Gravitation is also much less. A human being placed on the Moon could easily spring four or five times his own height and lift a mass weighing half a ton with the greatest of ease.

Astronomers have been able to map the surface, and the planes, craters and mountains have been measured and given names similar to those upon our Earth.

Seen through a powerful telescope the Moon is indeed a wonderful sight: Extinct volcanic craters of every conceivable variety ranging from half a mile to seventy-eight miles in diameter, chasms, a mile wide and of unfathomable depths, crags, pinnacles, precipices, vast plains, gloomy valleys and dark yawning pits form the most characteristic features.

The finest lunar range of mountains is named after the Appennines and is about 450 miles long containing about 300 lofty peaks, one of which rises about

18,000 feet. There are the lunar Alps also, containing innumerable lofty mountain peaks.

One of the largest and most impressive lunar craters is Copernicus. It has a diamenter of 56 miles and the summit of the ring rises 13,500 feet above the level of the surrounding plateau. In its center is a six-headed mountain whose peaks rise about 2400 feet.

The grey planes called "seas" appear to be smooth, but closer telescopic observation reveals these areas as innumerable slopes and irregularities, some of them lying much deeper in the Moon's surface than others.

These so-called "seas" have been given attractive names, such as: The Sea of Serenity; the Sea of Tranquility; Sea of Sleep; Lake of Dreams; Sea of Rains; Lake of Death; Ocean of Tempests; Sea of Putrefaction, etc, etc.

In conclusion, it is interesting to observe how closely the scientific view, given by Dr. Clyde Fisher, as to the origin of our Moon approximates that

given by Max Heindel.

Dr. Fisher says: "The moon is now regarded as an immense fragment of the earth that became detached through tidal strain when they were both molten; it is, therefore, probably composed of materials similar to the earth's. Being so much smaller, it has cooled more quickly."

Max Heindel says: "In the beginning of the Lemurian Epoch, these 'failures' (note that they were failures, not merely stragglers) had crystallized that part of the Earth occupied by them to such a degree that it became as a huge cinder or clinker, in the otherwise soft and fiery Earth. They were a hindrance and an obstruction, so they, with the part of the Earth they had crystallized, were thrown out into space beyond recall. This is the genesis of the Moon."

The Bible Story in the Stars

The Constellation



of Aries

"Behold the Lamb of God which taketh away the sin of the world."

(John 1:29.)

(IN TWELVE PARTS-PART EIGHT)

Here we are shown the foundation on which the blessings of the Redeemed rest, namely Atonement. We are reminded of the "blood of the Lamb."



RIES. This is the picture of a ram, full of vigor and life; not falling in death as Capricorn.

In the Denderah Zodiac its name is Tametouris Ammon, which means the reign, dominion, or government of Ammon. In that ancient picture the lamb's head is without horns, and is crowned with a circle. The Hebrew name is Taleh, the lamb. The Arabic name is Al Hamal, the sheep, gentle, merciful. The Akkadian name was Baraziggar-Bar meaning altar, or sacrifice, and ziggar meaning right making; so that the full name would be the sacrifice of righteousness. Its chief star, El Nath, means wounded, slain; next is Al Sheratan, the bruised, the wounded. Over the head of the figure is a triangle, which the old Greeks said exhibited the name of the Deity, and its principal star bears a name signifying the Head, the Uplifted. Hence the Lamb exalted to the divine glory, to the throne of the all-holy One.

The presentation accords with what the Scriptures say concerning the Seed of the woman. As the Son of man he is continually represented as the Head and Prince of the flock, the Lamb—"the Lamb that was slain"—the Lamb lifted to divine dominion and glory. In His exaltation He is represented as "the Lamb in the midst of the throne."

In legend Aries was a great ram with a golden fleece and possessed the ability to fly. Mercury brought this beautiful creature to Helle and Prixus, the persecuted children of the King of Thessaly, so they might climb upon its back and escape across the sea from their cruel stepmother. On the way over Helle lost her hold on the fleece, sank under the waves and was drowned. Ever after the Sea of Helle was known as the Hellespont. Prixus came safely to the end of his journey, and dedicated the ram to Jupiter, who placed it among the stars.

As in the sign of Pisces, where we saw one fish going in one direction and another a different way, we see in this myth one child losing its hold on the golden fleece and falling into the sea, while the other with a steadfast hold was securely borne to safety.

CASSIOPEIA

This is the figure of a woman crowned. In the last chapter we saw the woman bound. Here she is freed, delivered and enthroned. Some of the stars in the figure are El Sedar, the freed; Ruchba, the enthroned; and Caph, the branch. The name Cassiopeia means the beautiful, the daughter of splendor. Close by her side is Cephus, the King.

We can see reflected here "the Bride, the Lamb's wife, the heavenly city, the new Jerusalem," the "partakers of the

heavenly calling." The Jerusalem that is above "is the mother of us all." The scriptures reveal the secret that the congregation of Christ is to be the mystical "Body of Christ." The presentation is that of deliverance and heavenly triumph, as we speak of the Church triumphant. The Church is "the queen in gold of Ophir" of which the Psalmist (45:9) so enthusiastically sang. This enthroned woman sets forth the truth that the blessings founded on Atonement and the Redemption wrought by the Lamb that was slain, result in a glorious answer to Israel's prayer, "Turn our captivity, O Lord" (Ps. 126:4, 5), when they that have "sown in tears shall reap in joy," and the Lord shall loosen her bonds and place her enthroned by His side.

This, however, involves the destruction of her enemy, and this is what we see in the next picture.

CETUS, THE SEA MONSTER

This is a very large constellation low down, far away towards the south or lower regions of the sky. One of its ancient names was Knem, which means subdued. Its stars have names meaning, Menkar, the bound or chained enemy, Deneb Kaitos, overthrown or thrust down; Mira, the Rebel. Cetus is generally called The Whale, which is the natural enemy of fishes.

The doubled end of the Band which upholds the Fishes (Pisces), after passing the front foot or hand of Aries, the Lamb, is fastened on the neck of the monster and holds him firmly bound. He whom no man can take or bind, the Lamb has in His power. By the same power with which He upholds the Fishes He restrains the devouring Enemy. Isaiah prophesied of a day when "the Lord with His sore and great and strong sword shall punish Leviathan . . . and He shall slay the Dragon that is in the sea." (Isa. 27:1.)

PERSEUS

Here is the figure of a mighty man,

stepping with one foot on the brightest part of the Milky Way, wearing a helmet on his head and wings on his feet, holding aloft a great sword in his right hand, and carrying away the blood-dripping head of the Gorgon in his left hand. His ancient name was Perets, from which we have the Greek name Perses or Perseus, meaning the same as in Micah's prophecy, the Breaker. Some of the stars in the figure are: Atik, He who breaks; Al Genib, the One who carries away; Mirfak, Who helps; and Al Ghoul, the evil spirit.

The Breaker here must needs be Christ, the Lamb of our text, breaking the way of His people through all the doors and gates of their imprisonment and disability.

Perseus was one of the most beloved and admired of all the hero-gods of mythology. He was the son of the divine Father who came upon Danae in the form of a shower of gold. No sooner was he born than he and his mother were put into a chest and cast into the sea. They were rescued by fishermen on the coast and befriended by the king. His great courage and wisdom made him a favorite. Indebted to the king, he went in search of Medusa, the serpent-headed Gorgon. Pluto lent him his helmet, which had the power of rendering the wearer invisible; Minerva furnished her buckler, resplendent as a polished mirror; and Mercury gave him wings for his feet and a diamond sword for his hand. It was on his successful return from slaving the Medusa that he saw the beautiful Andromeda chained to the rock and the terrible monster of the sea advancing to devour her. He broke her chains, fought off and turned to stone the monster.

Again we see the promised Seed of the woman, the Lamb that was slain, going forward as the Breaker, bringing death and destruction to the monsters of evil, setting wronged captives free. The victorious Perseus comes for deliverance and to share His own triumphant immortality.



We have here a horoscope with fixed and cardinal signs on the four angles, Scorpio on the Ascendant. While Scorpio is a fixed sign it is also watery, and has as its ruler the fiery planet Mars, and so we find the mixture of fire and water. Both these elements are frequently quite prominent in the Scorpio child; he is at one time watery, fluidic or wavering, and at other times very fiery and fixed, hence it is often a difficult matter to understand him. And the parents must be most gentle and patient else the child will withdraw his confidence from them and become morose, resulting in a warped mental outlook.

Mars, the life ruler of this chart, is posited in the 2nd house in Sagittarius, and is well fortified by a sextile with the Sun in the fixed sign Aquarius in the fifth house indicating the pleasures, and worldly ambitions. Mars square the mystical planet Neptune from the 12th house shows a tendency to stand in his own light, to do those things which would interfere with his best interests, and should he become interested in Occultism he might be inclined to make wrong use of such teachings. However, there is a protecting influence which will watch over him in these things-the wonderful sextile of his own life ruler Mars to the Sun. This is the very best aspect one could wish for, more especially when the Sun's influence comes from the humanitarian sign Aquarius which is on the cusp of the Sun's house, the 5th.

We also find the Sun square Uranus in the 7th house, relations with partners, and the public in general. Hence we may expect that the boy will often respond to the Uranian influence in a manner adverse to his own welfare, and disappointing to those associated with him. The parents of this high-strung, nervous and talented boy have a special opportunity and responsibility, that of helping him to use the dynamic energy of this aspect of Sun square Uranus in a constructive They should remember that manner. an adverse aspect to either Sun or Mars is much better than no aspect, because an unaspected Sun and Mars makes the person listless, vapid, and in general of little account. Even with other planets well aspected, energy is lacking with which to will and then to act and carry through. This native's problem throughout his life and that of his parents during his early years will be to rightly direct the powers he has been given.

With the planetary combinations from the 2nd, 5th, and 7th houses we would advise the parents to educate this boy along mechanical lines, especially the electrical. This planetary configuration would give unusual talent also along the lines of radio or television. The mind will be unusually bright for we find a marvelous configuration of Saturn conjunction Jupiter, and both these planets sextile Mercury, the planet which has rule over the mind; it also is posited in the 5th house.

We find one danger in the life of this boy, which will come through his friends, for we find the Moon in the positive and fixed sign Leo in the house of friends in opposition to the Sun in the 5th house indicating pleasures; we also find Pluto in Leo in the 10th house near the cusp of the 11th and in opposition to the pleasure-loving planet Venus. Hence, from these indications he should be taught moderation in pleasures; also the importance to himself of curbing the lower nature in his relations to the opposite sex.

Teach this boy purity and the sacredness of the generative functions, which will in later years save him much sickness and unhappiness, for with Uranus, Jupiter, and Saturn in Taurus afflicted by the squares of the Sun, Moon, Venus, and Pluto there may be danger of contracting some life-destroying disease, and the right training may save him many unhappy days.

Should this boy have trouble with the tonsils we advise strongly against operations, which doctors are very prone to advise should there be any swelling of the throat. Women Clash on Campus Smokes

EXAMINER BUREAU, SACRAMENTO, April 3.—Shall "the kids" at the Los Angeles City College be permitted to smoke on the campus?

"Yes, by all means," says Mrs. Robert Green, wife of the Assemblyman—she is the former Betty Magruder, who in 1939 was president of the student body at L.A.C.C.

"Over my dead body," retorts Assemblywoman Eleanor Miller, chairman of the committee on education, to which Mrs. Green's "cigaret bill" was referred.

So it's a battle between ladies, no holds barred.

Mrs. Green as Betty Magruder grabbed the cigaret thing as one of the issues when she ran for student body president. "Smoking on the campus" was one of the planks of her platform, and she was elected. She says now that she is the bride of an Assemblyman, the "kids" are demanding she do something about it, for they still have to go to neighboring "joints" to smoke.

Assemblyman Charles Weber of Stockton, who is gallant to glamour, slipped the "cigaret bill" into a skeleton bill by Harrison W. Call without Miss Miller knowing what was happening. The bill goes to reprint and back to the committee, and then look out! Miss Miller will fight.

It is AB 1623. It would authorize boards of education to permit smoking on Junior College Campuses.—Sacramento News, May 1, 1941.

It is a well known fact that nicotine, which is the active principle in tobacco, is one of the most deadly poisons known to science. Tobacco brands average about three per cent nicotine content. The cigarette is the most dangerous form in which tobacco is used for the reason that certain poisons are found therein in addition to nicotine and earbon monoxide. Another reason why the cigarette is especially injurious is the fact that its smoke is usually inhaled, or drawn down into

the lungs. Now, the mucous lining of the mouth, nose, and lungs, and related air passages covers an approximate area of from eight hundred to two thousand square feet, over which the entire volume of the blood spreads in its frequent cycles. During inhalation, cigarette smoke with its poisonous contents is brought into direct contact with all this delicate membrane, which readily allows the poisons to pass through it into the blood. The absorption of this poison, although gradual and in minute quantities, impairs both the sense of taste and smell, and "smoker's sore throat" is a condition caused by the action of tobacco poisons on the delicate membranes around the vocal cords. Another disease quite prevalent among smokers is called "smoker's heart." All authorities among physiologists know that tobacco is a heart poison, which often results in apoplexy or heart failure.

Statistics prove that of 100,000 nonsmokers at the age of thirty, 66,564 were alive at the age of sixty, while of 100,000 moderate smokers at the age of thirty, only 61,911 were alive at sixty; and of 100,000 heavy smokers at the age of thirty, only 46,226 were alive at sixty. This shows that out of every 100,000 smokers, 25,000 are insidiously killed by tobacco between the ages of thirty and sixty. At the vast Battle Creek Sanitarium smoking in any part, or even in the gardens and on the golf courses, results in instant dismissal, and this rule applies to all physicians, employees, and patients as well.

The nervous system of women is more delicate and more easily injured than that of men, and when a woman becomes a slave to nicotine it seems almost impossible for her to break the habit. Of

all crimes committed against children, says a noted physician, the greatest one is the forcing of nicotine into the blood of an unborn baby, and that is exactly what occurs when an expectant mother smokes. "A baby born of a cigarette-smoking mother is sick. It is poisoned, and may die within two weeks of birth. The post-mortem shows degeneration of the liver, heart, and other organs . . . and sixty per cent of all such babies die before they are two years old."

In the light of such appalling statistics what are we to think of women holding responsible positions in the world openly espousing the smoking habit on our school campuses? Is it not high time that the thinking man and woman became aware of such conditions and took a united stand for the protection of our young people? Occult knowledge clearly indicates that any habit of the desire body that is dangerous to the physical vehicle, or interferes with the evolution of the spirit, should not be tolerated, and the one who indulges in such a habit is contracting a very severe debt of karma which will certainly have to be paid sooner or later. Furthermore, those, who remain calmly unconcerned and make no effort to protect the growing boy and girl from any form of threatened danger are shirking a responsibility that if taken advantage of would redound to their own glory, but if neglected makes them accessories to the crime perpetuated against a younger generation. We are indeed and in truth our brother's keeper, and doubly responsible if that brother has not yet developed the matured judgment needed to guide him across the many dangerous pitfalls of life.

The campus boys and girls of today will become the fathers and mothers of the next generation. Is it not then our bounden duty, as well as our sacred privilege, to help these young people to develop into strong, healthy, God-fearing men and women, worthy of becoming the progenitors of a new and glorious race?

Sterling North of the Chicago Daily News recently compared the present crop of comic magazines with the old-time dime novels which were surreptitiously read by the youth of an earlier day. Question:

Maybe the trouble is within myself. What I would like to have is a few concrete examples of how or where this teaching clarifies that of the Christian churches.

Answer:

It hardly seems possible that one interested in the occult could read the chapters in The Rosicrucian Cosmo-Conception entitled "Back to the Bible," "Occult Anaylsis of Genesis," and "Christ and His Mission," without receiving much light on the Bible. For instance, "The Occult Analysis of Genesis" explains in a logical way how our earth came into existence, showing that the days mentioned in the Bible were really great periods of time which coincide with the actual findings of geologists; it tells how man came into being, not as a single man and woman, but as a life wave of men and women. Adam and Eve being generic terms. This fact also explains how it was possible for Cain to go into a far-off country to secure a wife. It explains in a logical way how the separation of the sexes took place, and what the "Fall of Man" really was-the abuse of the creative force, and not the eating of an apple. "Christ and His Mission" explains how Christ took away the sins of the world, not just by the act of dying on the cross, but by entering the earth and purifying the substance of its various vehicles by raising their vibration and etherealizing their composition, thereby giving man better material out of which to build his various bodies.

Through making known the laws of rebirth and cause and effect the *Cosmo* proves the divine justice of God by showing how we are all the result of our own past lives and not just pawns of chance,

and that in the fullness of time we shall all attain perfection. It informs the reader as to the true life after death conditions which are not well explained in the Bible. It reveals the hidden truth contained in many obscure passages in the Bible, showing how when clearly explained such truths are reasonable and quite understandable. All of this appeals to the reasoning mind of the Christian, making his church teaching something that is not only provable but comprehensible as well, and not a mere theory that must be accepted on blind faith. How Invisible Helpers Materialize Question:

Not long ago I was told that it was possible for Invisible Helpers to materialize etheric hands to use in making adjustments on or in the physical body of a patient. I am at a loss to know just how this can be done. Will you be kind enough to explain the process?

Answer:

Therefore the spirits who pass away from this earth life are unable to materialize save through a medium, from whom they extract her living vital body, drape themselves therewith, and thus attract the physical substance necessary to make themselves visible to the sitters.

"There is a third class, namely, the initiated Invisible Helpers who have passed out of this life. They have learned to attract or repel physical matter by their wills, and therefore they are able to materialize despite the fact that their archetype has collapsed. 

Chemically-the Physical Body Is a Parasite

year plan for she concerns herself not with Time-an invention of man's-but solely with Perfection. In such a design for Life there are, naturally, many ties running in all directions and sometimes we can pick up a connecting thread and follow it through the intricate design without much effort.

For instance, we know that it is the force of gravitation which is the tie that binds each and every member of our universe: sun, stars, and planets, into a composite unit. In turn our universe is so tied in with other universes and so on, apparently without end. That picture is of broad design with its main features prominent and its details easy to follow.

Sometimes, however, the design is not so broad. As an example, let us pick up one of the threads of that particular design which binds the sun and man in close and vital intimacy. At first the design is not so apparent, the ultimate end not so readily seen, the conclusion not so readily drawn, but the thread of the design once found and carefully followed leads on through a series of intricate and comprehensive details to reveal, finally,

an amazing picture, one so wonderful that it cannot but leave us awed and reverent

Primitive man looked forward to the daily appearance of the sun for it not only dispelled the darkness of night with its attendant horrors and dangers, but it also brought him light, heat, and the opportunity of renewing his daily food supply. Naturally this beneficent "being," although quite a mysterious one, came to be worshiped as a God and, as naturally, anything that interfered with the sun's actions, such as an eclipse or darkness, was clearly evil and to be feared.

Today our knowledge of the sun is somewhat more precise for we know its diameter, its comparative temperatures, its density; that it is never at rest but is constantly shooting out tongues of flame over half a million miles high; and that it is the center of our particular Universe.

As to the existence of a definite physical relationship between the sun and man most of us are not quite so sure although we admit that there is certain evidence which tends to support such a belief. Yet all speculation aside, there is an actual and definite physical tie between man and the sun, one which is so important that without it no life could exist on the face of the earth.

This link is one of the commonest substances on earth, yet it is one of the most, if not the most important thing in life, for it provides us with all the materials and energies we use. This essential thing is the green coloring matter which exists in vegetation and without which no animal life could exist on this earth. As a matter of fact, vegetation preceded animal life on this planet millions of years.

The name of this substance is chlo-

rophyll.

It is known that any illuminated surface absorbs a certain amount of light and that the light so absorbed brings about a change in the chemical make-up of the surface so illuminated. Nature makes use of this truth to produce carbohydrates through the agency of the

plants which catch, on their leaf surfaces, about two per cent of the solar energy thrown on the earth.

Plants are the great synthetic chemists of Nature for their green coloring matter, chlorophyll, enables them to use this solar energy for the purpose of synthesizing car-

bohydrates and other complex compounds from the carbon dioxide exhaled by man. Although the plants receive only two per cent or less of the sun's energy they make exceedingly great use of this small quantity as we may see from the following estimates of production:

Charles Morrow Wilson estimates that the vegetation on the entire earth's surface manufactures at least one cubic mile of sugar every year. He also states that if an acre of land yields one hundred bushels of corn, then there is, approximately, two acres of leaf surface and this surface area has, by the aid of sunlight, produced seven tons of material, more or less. Differently stated it will take one square yard of leaf surface 20 days in which to manufacture the amount of carbohydrates contained in one pound of bread.

Remarkable as chlorophyll is as a converter of solar energy, it becomes more important still when we find that there appears to be a close relationship between chlorophyll and our own blood pigments. The haemoglobin in our blood is an extremely important substance for we know it possesses the power to combine loosely with oxygen and by its aid the blood cells are able to transport, from the lungs, quantities of that gas to the tissues in order that we may live. When haemoglobin is combined with iron it vields derivatives called cytochromes, which, although present in red blood cells and all living cells in only very minute quantity, play an indispensable part in every life process.

When the complex chlorophyll molecule

is broken down into more simple substances we find that these are similar to substances appearing in man's organism, in the walls of his stomach and in his bile. Significantly, when these substances derived from the chlorophyll molecule are fed to rats they stimulate the formation of red blood

cells. One should note, therefore, the important part iron plays both in our blood and in the chlorophyll molecule. Without the proper amount of iron, man's blood becomes deficient and without iron in its food the plant cannot produce chlorophyll.

In view of all the existing facts, Science has come to believe that the only molecular difference between blood and chlorophyll is that the center atom of blood contains iron and the center atom of the chlorophyll molecule contains manganese.

So far we have seen that the sugars and starches are manufactured by the plants from sunshine (via the chlorophyll cells), water, and the carbondioxide of the air. Nature's next step is to add to these sugars and starches a trace of nitrogen and sometimes sulphur from the soil and to synthesize from these ingredients the amino-acids from which the life-supporting proteins are built.

While it is not as simple as all this, for the chemical path by which proteins may be formed is uncertain, it is clearly demonstrated that whatever the method, plants are adepts in its use. On the other hand, man has but little ability to synthesize the amino-acids, the muscle builders, so he has to eat the complete proteins which contain all the necessary amino-acids.

Science recognizes twenty-one aminoacids existing in the natural proteins but only nine of them have been found to be absolutely essential for the life of the higher animals, and these have to be in their food in order that they may live. However, many million different proteins or protein-like compounds can be formed from twenty amino-acids.

But living matter is not merely a throwing together, in some promiscuous fashion of a series of compounds; it has a definite structure and its component parts have to be built up according to design. The smallest units when produced form part of greater structures and these in turn become part of a still greater whole.

According to design the proteins are built up by a process of condensation from the more simple units, the aminoacids; the carbohydrates are constructed on a similar plan but in their case the unit is the molecule of a simple sugar and, in turn, a combination of simple sugars produces glycogen, starch, and cellulose.

It is from these constituents that the living cells are produced and then become part of the living organism. Proteins make up the vital part of that essential jelly material of the living cell, the protoplasm, the stream of life, and, naturally, most of the more remarkable characteristic activities of the living cell are associated with protein.

As in the case of his carbohydrates man derives his proteins directly or indirectly from the plants, breaks them up by digestion into their component aminoacids and then proceeds to build up his own particular proteins where they are wanted out of the varied assortment of amino-acids his blood has obtained from his digestive tract. A little thought will show that the eating of food and its subsequent burning in the body is but a reversal of the process by which the solar energy is captured by the chlorophyll cells and stored in the plant in the nature of somewhat unstable chemical compounds.

Protein is the chief constituent of most tissue and as all living tissues are constantly being torn down they must be built up again. This process, known as metabolism, is greatest when the body is at work, less when it is at rest, and even far from being negligible when it is asleep. Consequently broken-down tissues must ever be replaced and the tissues must either synthesize the spare parts required or obtain them from foods which represent the chemical replacements of the materials used up in the process of metabolism. So there must be an adequate supply of protein, as well as carbohydrates, fatty compounds, minerals, and vitamins in the food supply if body equilibrium is to be maintained.

Thus far the main factors in man's food supply have been considered. These are the proteins built up from the aminoacids, and the carbohydrates, both of which must be supplied in liberal quantities in order that the body may create its essential structures. As man cannot manufacture these from simpler compounds, it is well for him that the plants will always be here to create the basic materials of his diet—the sugars, starches, fats, and proteins.

In previous years man's main efforts were confined solely to the study of the effects of various external factors, such as soil and fertilizer, temperature and light, moisture and cultivation, on the growth and proper development of plants. However, as soon as it was realized that there was a closer relationship exist-

ing between vegetation and man the subject of plant growth was given great and careful attention.

As a result it was Julius Sachs, some sixty years back, who, after considerable research, concluded that there were in the plants some chemical substances apart from their ordinary foods, which although present in but small quantities, yet affected, powerfully, all plant growth. Today we know that these substances are produced by almost all plants as a byproduct of their photosynthesis-that process by which the carbohydrates are manufactured from carbon dioxide and water through the agency of the chlorophyll cells and sunlight-and that not only are these substances essential for the plant's growth and development but they are also indispensable for the efficient operation of man's physical body. Man must have these in his diet but as he cannot manufacture them in his body he has to obtain his supply of these indispensable substances, now known as vitamins, from the plants.

Thus is shown man's dependence on the plants for physical existence. However, this parasitic condition of his does not end here but extends beyond the physiological and reaches the psychological, for we find definite connection and mutual dependence existing between the endocrine glands (the glands of personality), the vitamins, and, indeed, the entire nutritional supply.

However, before examining this relationship in detail it would be well to look back some thirty-five years when Science discovered in animals certain chemical substances now known as hormones, which perform for animals duties similar to those carried out by the vitamins for the plants and with much the same results.

Dr. James Bonner points out that the distinction between a vitamin and a hormone is not very sharp for both are needed in the body for specific physiological processes. He defines a hormone as a substance which is produced in one part of an organism, is transferred to

another part and there, in very minute amounts, influences a specific physiological process, a vitamin must be supplied from the outside and in the case of man he gets his from the plant which, as we have seen, make them with the aid of sunlight and the chlorophyll cells.

Dr. Bonner goes on to say that a substance which is a hormone for one organism may be a vitamin for other organisms and gives as an example, ascorbic acid (vitamin C) which, as it is not formed by most higher animals must be supplied to them, but which is produced by the rat in its own liver; this substance is a hormone for the rat but it is a vitamin for all other animals and for man.

Another distinction which we must keep in mind is that hormones stimulate growth with positive effect but there is no evidence that vitamins exercise any stimulating action on growth despite the fact that vitamins are indispensable components of living cells and if not present in sufficient supply the normal number of cells cannot be created in the body.

There is a great similarity between the workings of not only the vitamins and the hormones but also between these and the auxins, the growth promoters of plants, and the bios (life) of yeast, a group of interrelated compounds which control the life processes in some way unexplained at the present time.

This digression was necessary in order to indicate the comparative workings of those controllers of the life processes, the vitamins and the auxins of plants, the bios of yeast, and the hormones of man, before taking up the relationship of the vitamins, as well as the entire nutritional supply, to the hormones of the endocrine glands.

Man is particularly dependent on the vitamins for the proper functioning of his endocrine glands, and if these are not present in his diet in sufficient quantities disturbance follows, either in the production or in the use of the glandular secretions or hormones.

Both vitamins and hormones are catalytic in action; both influence the most fundamental activities of the body, such as growth, metabolism, digestion, and circulation. There is, at all times, an intimate balance between these two in all the cells and tissues of the human body.

There is also direct interdependence between vitamins and hormones, for a vitamin may be necessary either at the point of manufacture of a hormone, for instance, vitamin E and the pituitary, or at the point of action of a hormone, as when we find both vitamin B and insulin acting in the muscle consumption of sugar.

The endocrine glands are called ductless because they discharge their secretions directly into the blood stream. Modern medical science acknowledges the existence of twenty-five of these glands but considers only the following of major importance: the pineal and the pituitary, in the head; the thyroid and four parathyroids, in the neck; the Islet of Langerhans, in the pancreas; two sex glands; two adrenal glands, above the kidneys; the thymus, in the chest; the spleen, near the stomach.

The endocrine glands, although very much smaller than either stomach, intestines, lungs, or heart, have a direct and powerful influence over them and influence, in a marked degree, all bodily functions and structures. In fact, any change in the blood supply brought about by breathing, exercise, the eating of food, the state of the weather, or an emotional outburst, immediately brings into play the automatic action of the endocrine glands in an effort to restore to the individual his normal condition of blood and brain.

The secretions from these glands which, as we have seen, are necessary to the conservation of the body as a whole, are called hormones because they speed like messengers through the circulation, stimulating or inhibiting such functions as may be necessary in order to maintain a balance in the various operations taking place in the body.

The pituitary may be called the leader

of all the endocrine glands on account of its many functions and the dominance it exerts over all body activities, but all of the endocrine glands interact and influence each other to a most marked degree. For instance, one may have diabetes on account of a disturbance of the pituitary, as well as from a mal-functioning of the Islet of Langerhans in the pancreas, a source which is more common, however, and therefore better known.

Interaction is also found in the fact that sex glands do not act except under stimulation of an entirely non-sex hormone made by the pituitary at the base of the brain; a contradiction of the general belief, held until recently, that all the sex hormones (quite a few) were produced from cholesterol, a waxy substance found in living tissues and in the brain.

Some of the endocrine glands secrete more than one hormone; the pituitary gland is known to produce six hormones, and in all the glands exists the possibility that the flow of secretion (the hormones) may be normal, abnormal, or subnormal either in quantity or quality.

Dr. R. G. Hoskins of the Memorial Foundation for Neuro-Endocrine Research at Harvard Medical School recently pointed out that if the total number of hormones produced by the endocrine glands were taken as fifteen (an underestimate), and if the number of possible conditions of each hormone were taken as three as previously mentioned, then the total number of possible combinations of glandular activity would exceed fourteen million.

The effects of such interaction, although not generally appreciated, may be seen in the clear-cut and universal manner in which these glands maintain physiological equilibrium by series of checks and balances in the human body.

Other effects may be seen in the efforts of the endocrine glands, by their influence through brain and nervous system, to maintain psychological balance also; for instance, a condition of fear and

worry will throw an extra secretion of the adrenal hormones, adrenalin and cortin, into the blood stream but as soon as the anxiety state stops, the flow of secretion ends and the endocrine glands restore the body to normal condition.

However, if this mental condition of fear and worry persists, the hormones continue to flow, the body remains in a condition of instability which, in turn, irritates the sympathetic nervous system with subsequent brain disturbance, and fundamental changes both in the blood chemistry and in the physical structure.

Dr. Louis Berman sums up the importance of the endocrine glands to man by saying that an individual is as good and as efficient as the interlocking activities of his nervous and glandular systems and that these, in turn, depend not only upon an abundant supply of the vitamins but also upon all the other foods in proper proportion.

So whether it be the carbohydrates for his energy, or the amino-acids from which to build the proteins to replace his worn-out tissues, or the vitamins necessary for physiological and psychological balance, man must obtain these substances, already prepared for his use. from the bodies of plants-all of which makes man, chemically at least, much of a parasite.






