"The Light of the World"

THE apostle John gave us a wonderful definition of Deity when he said that "God is Light." Anyone who takes this passage for meditation will find a rich reward waiting, for no matter how many times we take up the subject, our own development in the passing years assures us each time a fuller and better understanding. Each time we sink ourselves in these three words we lave in a spiritual fountain of inexhaustible depth, and each succeeding time we sound more thoroughly the divine depths and draw more closely to our Father in Heaven.

No other description is capable of conveying so much of the nature of God as the three words: "God is Light." The invisible light that is clothed in the flame upon the altar is an apt representation of God, the Father. In the bells we have an apt symbol of Christ, the Word, for their metal tongues proclaim the gospel message of peace and good will, while the incense brings an added spiritual fervor, representing the power of the Holy Spirit. The Trinity is thus symbolically part of the celebration which makes Christmas the most spiritually joyful time of the year from the standpoint of the human race which is now embodied and working in the physical world.

To come into closer touch with our subject, let us go back in time to get our bearings and the direction of our future line of progress.

The first time our consciousness was directed toward the Light was shortly after we had become endowed with mind and had entered definitely upon our evolution as human beings in Atlantis, the land of the mist, deep down in the basins of the Earth, where the warm mist emitted from the cooling Earth hung like a dense fog over the land. Then the starry heights of the universe were never seen. nor could the silvery light of the Moon penetrate the dense foggy atmosphere which hung over that ancient land. Even the fiery splendor of the Sun was almost totally extinguished, for when we look in the Memory of Nature pertaining to that time, we find that the Sun was exceedingly dim, having an aura of various colors, very similar to those we observe around an arc light.

But this light had a fascination. The ancient Atlanteans were taught by the divine Hierarchs who walked among them to aspire to the light, and as the spiritual light was then already on the wane, they aspired all the more ardently to the new light, for they feared the darkness of which they had become conscious through the gift of mind.

Then came the inevitable flood when the mist cooled and condensed. The atmosphere cleared, and the "chosen people" were saved. Those who had worked within themselves and learned to build the necessary organs required to breathe in an atmosphere such as we have today, survived and came to light. It was not an arbitrary choice: the work of the past consisted of body building. Those who had only gill clefts, such as the foetus still uses in its prenatal development, were as unfit physiologically to enter the new era as the foetus would be to be born were it to neglect to build lungs. It would die as those ancient people died when the rare atmosphere made gill clefts useless.

Since the day when we came out of ancient Atlantis our bodies have been practically complete, but from that time and from now on those who wish to follow the light must strive for soul growth. The bodies which we have crystallized about us must be dissolved, and the quintessence of experience extracted, which as "soul" may be amalgamated with the Spirit to nourish it from impotence to omnipotence. Therefore, the Tabernacle in the Wilderness was given to the ancients, and the Light of God descended upon the Altar of Sacrifice. This is of great significance: the Ego had just descended into its tabernacle, the body.

We all know the tendency of the primitive instinct toward selfishness, and if we have studied the higher ethics we also know how subversive of good the indulgence of the egotistic tendency is; therefore, God immediately placed before man the Divine Light upon the Altar of Sacrifice.

Upon this altar they were forced by dire necessity to offer their cherished possessions for every transgression, God appearing to them as a hard taskmaster whose displeasure it was dangerous to incur. But still the Light drew them. They knew that it was futile to attempt to escape from the hand of God. They had never heard the words of John: "God is Light," but they had already learned from the heavens in a measure the meaning of infinitude, as measured by the realm of light, for we hear David exclaim, "Whither shall I go from Thy Spirit? or whither shall I flee from Thy presence?

... If I take the wings of the morning, and dwell in the uttermost parts of the sea, even there shall Thy hand lead me and Thy right hand shall hold me . . . Yea, the darkness hideth not from Thee, but the night shineth as the day, for the darkness and the light are both alike to Thee."

With every year that passes, with the aid of the greatest telescopes which the ingenuity and mechanical skill of man have been able to construct to pierce the depths of space, it becomes more evident that the infinitude of light teaches us the infinitude of God. When we hear that "men loved darkness rather than Light because their deeds were evil," that also rings true to what we unfortunately know as present-day facts, and illumines the nature of God for us. Is it not true that we always feel endangered in the dark, but that the light gives us a sense of safety?

To render permanent this condition of being in the Light was the next step in God's work with us, which culminated in the birth of the Christ (Jesus), Who, as the bodily presence of the Father, bore about in Himself that Light, for the Light came into the world that whosoever should believe in Christ should not perish, but have everlasting life. He said, "I am the Light of the World."

The altar in the tabernacle had illustrated the principle of sacrifice as the medium of regeneration, so Christ Jesus said to His disciples: "Greater love hath no man than this, that he lay down his life for his friends. Ye are my friends." And forthwith He commenced a sacrifice, which was not consummated in a few hours of physical suffering upon a material cross, but is as perpetual as were the sacrifices made upon the altar of the Tabernacle in the Wilderness, for it entails an annual descent into the Earth and an endurance of all that the cramping Earth conditions must mean to such a great Spirit.

Each year since Christ was crucified on Golgotha, on the twenty-first of September when the Sun passes from the

zodiacal sign Virgo into the sign Libra, the Christ Spirit returning to our Earth touches its atmosphere. He reaches the center of our Earth at midnight, December twenty-fourth. There He remains for three days, and then He starts to withdraw. This withdrawal is completed at Easter. From Easter until the summer solstice He is passing through the higher worlds, and reaches the World of Divine Spirit, the throne of the Father, on June twenty-first. During July and August, while the Sun is in Cancer and Leo, He is rebuilding His Life Spirit vehicle which He is again to bring to the world and with it rejuvenate the Earth and the life kingdoms evolving in and on it. From Christmas until Easter He gives of Himself without stint or measure, endowing with life, not only the sleeping seeds, but everything about, on, and within the Earth.

This must continue until a sufficient number have evolved who can bear the burden of this dense lump of darkness which we call the Earth, and which hangs as a millstone about the neck of humanity, an impediment to further spiritual growth. Until we learn to follow "in His steps," we can rise no higher toward the Light.

In the past period of our spiritual career we have been looking for a Light exterior to ourselves, but now we have arrived at the point where we must look for the Christ Light within and emulate Him by making of ourselves "living sacrifices" as He is doing. Let us remember that when the sacrifice which lies before our door seems pleasant and to our liking, when we seem able to pick and choose our work in His vineyard and do what pleases, we are not making a real sacrifice as He did, nor are we when we are seen of men and applauded for our benevolence. But when we are ready to follow Him from that festive board (the Lord's Supper) where He was the honored one among friends, into the Garden of

When we are content to follow "in His steps" to that point of self-sacrifice where we can say from the bottom of our hearts, "Thy will, not mine," then we have surely the light within, and there will never henceforth be for us that which we feel as darkness. We shall walk in the light.



This is our glorious privilege, and meditation upon the words of the apostle, "God is Light," will help us realize this ideal, provided we add to our faith, works, and say by our deeds as did the Christ, "This is my body and this is my blood," a living sacrifice upon the altar of humanity.

Christ and His Mission

Part I

In the world scheme, the immediate assignment for the human family is to fashion, in detail, the plans for the new Aquarian Age.

Sixty years ago, Max Heindel released his understanding of the world plan, and his basic premise was the importance of Mystic Christianity in carrying forward these new requirements. He wrote:

"According to the Bible, man was to have dominion over all the world, but in the majority of cases the reverse is true— it is the world which has dominion over man."

The promise of the Aquarian Age, the Age of Brotherhood in the human family, could oring fulfillment of the divine destiny for all men as they prove themselves capable of dominion. Mystic Christianity can throw some light on the real meaning of Brotherhood.

This leads us to look deeper into the mission of Christ, whose sole purpose was to turn the tide of complete involvement in personality achievements for selfish interests, to the Real, Eternal, Divine Self—the only One who can regain the lost dominion over the world and its fascinating form life. Christ defined His mission with these words: "I have come to do the will of my Father;" and His will is "to love God and to love one another." He came to relate Spirit and form, to establish union with the Father.

The Old Testament has a revelation for all who will search for its underlying message because it gives detailed instruction about the steps that led to the coming of Christ. It also makes clear the foundation for the coming of the Christ Spirit in every human being.

How WAS the consciousness of humanity to be directed into completely new channels in order to regain dominion over all the world? One human was needed—

one who could qualify to house the Christ Spirit. This man was Jesus of Nazareth.

And who was Jesus? Let us look deeper!

The Bible is the study of all men and their spiritual development. In reading the lineage of the man Jesus, the Gospel of Matthew begins with these words: "The book of the generation of Jesus Christ, the son of David, the son of Abraham." This immediately links us with the Old Testament. Matthew especially emphasizes David, the king. Jesus has also been cited as the "SEED" of David, Esoterically, both David and Abraham are "seeds" in consciousness. Jesus, then, is a type study.

The Divine Right of Kings had its origin long before written history. During the Golden Age of the past, great Beings known in our philosophical terms as the Lords of Venus and the Lords of Mercury were sent to help humanity, then in its infancy, to develop WILL and JUDG-MENT. Humanity regarded them as messengers of the gods.

The most responsive and adaptable to this plan were given special instruction in self-mastery to become the leaders of the people. They promoted equity and well-being among their charges. They served, not for self-aggrandizement and arrogation of their rights at the expense of the people, but in wisdom and judgment. These initiates were exalted to kingship and were the founders of the Dynasties of Divine Rulers who were truly kings by "the Grace of God."

As time passed, there was a change. The kings became self-involved and wholly concerned with personal power and glory. The Golden Age passed into history; but this proved to be the foundation for training all humanity to rule over themselves, each to achieve self-mastery

and to rule over his own kingdom of Self.

Milleniums passed. Finally a prophet of Israel, Isaiah, looked ahead to future centuries and foresaw, as recorded in the scriptures:

"...a child is born...a Son is given; the government shall be upon His shoulders and His name shall be called Wonderful, Counsellor, the Mighty God, the Everlasting Father, the Prince of Peace. Of the increase of His government there shall be no end, upon the throne of David."

Centuries later, Paul, preaching at Antioch, reminded the people of a promise made long ago: "I have found David, the son of Jesse, a man after mine own heart which shall fulfill my will. Of this man's seed hath God according to His promise raised unto Israel a Saviour, Jesus."

What did David have that linked him to the ancient divine rulership as a SEED? The key line is, "... which shall fulfill my will." Will, Judgment, lost so long ago, now ready to rise once more among men.

The Old Testament describes so clearly the approach of the Christ Spirit as the bodies of a new race were sensitized to the reception of spirit. Abraham is the first patriarch after Noah who survived the sinking of Atlantis, spoken of in the Bible as the Flood. Noah built an Ark, a special physical body to survive the closing of the Fourth Root Race. That physical body was sensitive to the "inner voice" who gave instructions for building the Ark. Noah became the archetypal seed for the physical body of the new Fifth Race.

Abraham also received instruction from the Inner Man. He was told:

"Get thee hence to a new land (new consciousness) to establish a new nation."

This was the promise:

"I will multiply thy seed as the stars of the heavens...In thy seed shall all the nations of the earth be blessed."

Abraham followed the counselling of the Inner Voice and sought a new land, the land of Canaan—the new consciousness. He built an altar to make sacred his arrival. Many battles with kings followed, two of whom were the kings of Sodom and Gomorrah where the slime pits of lower desires flourished.

Abraham became the symbol of the new desire body. The conquest of Sodom and Gomorrah was a triumph for the Divine Self: and following that victory Abraham met Melchizedek, King of Righteousness and Peace, and priest of the Most High God. Melchizedek blessed Abraham and gave him the sacrament of bread and wine, establishing a link between body and Spirit. He also reminded Abraham that GOD had delivered his enemies into his hands (enemies of self). The meeting with Melchizedek is the first recognition of the Inner Christ, Divine Indwelling Presence in the new man — a seed that was to bear fruit 2000 years later.

Moses may be considered the symbol of the mind and its new capacities. He communed with the Most High on Mt. Horeb where he received his commission to lead his people out of Egypt, land of the fleshpots, where they were held in slavery.

Moses was introduced to the I AM Presence within himself that would supply the wisdom needed in handling Pharoah whose power was supreme in Egypt. Moses was also given new laws for reorienting the personality—the Ten Commandments. They stressed the points: you are to love only God, the Divinity Within; also, do not covet, do not steal, kill, or commit adultery. Moses was given the plans for completing the new form temple which contained the Holy of Holies, the place for communing directly with the I AM Presence.

David was the culmination of all qualities prepared in Noah, Abraham, and Moses. David, identified as the seed, was the potential for spiritualizing mind and emotions, head and heart, in preparation for turning personal will to Divine Will.

He was annointed by the prophet Samuel while just a shepherd lad and his prophetic powers were quickened. "The Spirit of the Lord (the Inner Self) came upon him."

His first challenge was to overcome a giant, Goliath, symbol of the personality, who led a great army (the accumulated misdeeds of the past) against Israel. Saul was the reigning king at the time—Saul, the reasoning mind. He had been chosen king because he was "head and shoulders above his fellowmen."

Intelligence in itself was not enough to handle such a staggering problem. David offered to meet this "shadow self" and Saul gratefully accepted. He offered David his armor (the limitation of the reasoning mind), but David needed another type of protection. He said to Goliath:

"Thou comest to me with sword, spear, and shield; but I come to thee in the name of the Lord of hosts. This day will the Lord (the Divine Self) deliver thee into mine hands."

David selected five stones, representing the power of the five senses, but really ONE STONE, the Stone of Truth, and, using his sling shot, he slew this monster by hitting him in the forehead, location of the third eye, the Eye Divine. That EYE became the new seat of government of the kingdom within, with the Divine Self as ruler. Here was another new potential in the SEED, individual Divine Rulership.

Saul recognized this power in David, saw it was valuable, and David went to live in the palace; but Saul's attention was centered on the form side of life and he became ill with his own dark images of resentment and jealousy.

"Saul has slain his thousands, but David has slain his tens of thousands," the people sang.

David, the higher consciousness, played on his seven-stringed lyre, thus aligning the seven centers of divine power with the reasoning mind and its higher counterpart, the higher mind.

"Be still and KNOW that I AM GOD. I will be exalted in all the earth," he sang to Saul.

With alignment of the two selves, the potential healing was established in the SEED.

Another power came with the passing of Saul. David became king. A king is a ruler — one in authority, one responsible for many; also one who should have courage, thoughtfulness, love for his people, self control, and a high sense of honor: soul qualities. His first act was to unite the two kingdoms, Israel and Judah, and to bring to Jerusalem, city of peace, the Ark of the Covenant (soul power).

Soul is the mediator between form and Spirit. The Ark of the Covenant occupied the most important place in the temple, the Holy of Holies, the place of the Sanctuary of the Presence, the place of direct communion with the Most High.

"There I will commune with thee from above the mercy seat; I will show thee the way," was the instruction given to Moses. Jerusalem became the heart center of the Earth.

The heart is the center of the love nature; here David was to be tested immediately. The Divine Right of Kings had finally regained its original status, but the love nature had to prove itself—love for power and authority and their right use, but also love for God.


THE INNS ARE TOO CROWDED

E'VE all said at one time or another, "Oh, well, you can't take it with you," and we are quite right when we speak of material possessions and accumulations. But there are things we can take with us, provided we have acquired them. Rather than "things" perhaps we should say "qualities."

The Mellowing Process

The mellowing process is a significant attribute of evolutionary fulfillment. The gentlest people are those who have attained the most spiritual progress. Mellowness and compassion go hand in hand, and only those who have experienced and suffered intensively at some period during their evolution can know the true meaning of compassion. Those who can read the Memory of Nature report harrowing pictures of the depths of cruelty and unbelievable bestiality to which the human race as.a whole sank while attaining the nadir of materiality. Most civilized people, were they now able to witness these horrendous scenes, would regard them with complete disbelief and say, "I couldn't have done such things!" The fact of the matter evidently is, however, that we all have, in previous lives, committed deeds of incomprehensibly barbarous savagery and inhumanity.

As we are told in Letters to Students, No. 89: "To Nimrod, the Fourth Race man, who had a mind, meat was given. Wine was supplied by Noah to the Fifth Race man. It made him a Godless egotist, so that man's inhumanity to man has become a byword; but it also helped him to reach the nadir of his material evolution. Now, however, the spiritual evolution is about to begin, and altruistic ideas must be fostered, or at least started to germinating, so that they may be expressed by the Sixth Race. This

again requires a change in diet."

There is no question that both meat and wine have had their hardening, brutalizing effect upon humanity, and that we would not have reached the depths of materiality, which had to be attained before the upward swing of evolution could begin, without them. There is also no question that, aided by these foods. we achieved the pitiless, unrelenting, vengeful qualities of character which must be completely erased from our constitutions, often in a most painful manner. Without the vegetarian diet, the human race will not be able fully to bring about this transformation. When abstention from flesh foods for compassionate reasons becomes universal then there will be peace on Earth, and the virtues of altruism and compassion will take precedence over all others.

Under the Law of Consequence we must all, in one form or another, reap the harvest of brutality which we have sown in previous lives. Much of the suffering now so prevalent everywhere in the world stems from these misdeeds, as will, unfortunately, suffering in future generations be traceable to acts of cruelty and depravity still all too common in "civilized society." Those of us who are fortunate enough to be aware of the true meaning of the state of grace available under the Christian Dispensation can, if sincerely repentant, engage in efforts of restitution and reform, thus expiating now some of the sins for which we are still accountable and cleaning our slates for future lives. The process of repentance, restitution, and reform in itself assures a mellowing of character and attitude, for we cannot sincerely regret our misdeeds and their effects upon our fellow men without feeling some of the discomfort we have caused them. In fact, one of the most acute tortures

which anyone can experience is the mental agony of real remorse, when tears of contrition are shed. The subsequent process of atonement may then bring us into direct contact with those whom we have wronged. When we try to "make it up" to them, and receive the ensuing assurance of their understanding and forgiveness, another small furthering of our own internal mellowing takes place. The sometimes tearful, always intense, procedure of making up after a misunderstanding, or after the perpetration of an injustice, and the resultant feeling of contentment, peace, and mutual harmony which is so deep and so complete that only those who have experienced it can accurately describe it, invariably causes a lasting impression upon all parties involved, and serves further to "soften" them.

Most people would agree, furthermore, that we "mellow" with age. Displays of cruel behavior among children are comchildren are notoriously selfmon: centered and often unfeeling in their conduct toward others. As they mature, they develop increasing amounts of social conscience and consciousness, and this will become more apparent in each succeeding generation as the Aquarian Age approaches. The extent of humanitarianism displayed by the generation now in its late teens and early adulthood far surpasses that displayed by any group of similar age in recorded human history. The cosmic Aquarian influences which are already now making themselves felt account for the speed with which the growing universal impulse toward compassion is spreading, and this is further augmented by the close proximity into which all parts of the world have been brought by means of modern communication.

Even the members of the present particularly compassionate younger generation may be expected to become more mellow as they become more mature. These young people, when they first become knowledgeably aware of the suffering and seeming injustice in the

world, are incensed at what they see around them, and their feelings of anger, frustration, and even revenge against those they deem responsible are sometimes as intense as are the stirrings of pity and brotherly love which incite them to action on behalf of the wronged and oppressed. Even though these Egos have developed their Higher Selves to the point at which the desire to serve and help others is replacing self-aggrandizement, the lower nature is still making itself felt. The age-old emotions of anger and temper still exist. Since such feelings have no more place in the service of others than they have in the development of self, they must eventually be completely expunged. The mellowing process, here too, has its place.

Violence occurring on college campuses, in cities, and elsewhere, in the name of social reform, is a relatively recent phenomenon. Nevertheless, some former participants in these far-from-peaceful demonstrations are already on record as rejecting the future use of violence, and as saying that wrongs cannot be righted in this manner. They have learned an important lesson in a very short time.

We are not speaking here, of course, of that fringe of society to whom violence is a way of life, or of those who are under the control of the nefarious forces seeking to foment violence for their own dark purposes. Those poor Egos still have much to learn, spiritually and emotionally as well as mentally, before they will respond favorably and positively, rather than destructively and negatively, to the Uranian ray of change which is underlying more and more social activity. We are, instead, speaking of the more sensitive element among humanity which is coming to realize that exercise of the lower emotions must not be rationalized for any reason, since these emotions are exclusively destructive and, ultimately, self-defeating. Some people, even among the more altruistically inclined, learn this lesson much more quickly than others, and some members of the race may require many more lifetimes before these essentially selfish emotions will become amenable to the promptings of the Higher Self. All this, ultimately, will come under the heading of "mellowing."

The truly spiritual person is one to whom the mellowing process has become very familiar. We may be sure that he knows what it is to suffer, that he has himself experienced, at one time or another, much of the gamut of physical, mental, and emotional tortures to which the race seems to be heir. Partly as a result of this, he has also developed his intuitive powers to the point at which he can "identify" with other people, put himself in their place, and quite literally feel within himself the internal turbulence which might be raging within them. Thus, what he has not learned by experience, he has learned by observation, and his resulting understanding of what makes mankind "tick" has helped him to unfold a supreme degree of fellowfeeling and love.

This, in turn, has imbued him with an innate gentleness unsurpassed by most of his compeers. The perhaps natural feelings of anger at evidence of injustice, crime, or other evil which are expressed by those who mean well but are not yet in complete control of their faculties have, in the spiritually astute person, been transmuted into tolerance, pity, and forgiveness. While not condoning the evil, he is well aware of the shortcomings and spiritual lack that prompt his fellow men to engage in it. While recognizing the need to restrain evildoers, he encourages rehabilitation rather than punishment, and clemency whenever feasible in the broader social interest. He views the deliberate perpetrators of evil, as well as people who simply lack the will-power to keep themselves from doing wrong, with sympathy rather than contempt, and mercy rather than dislike. He becomes ever more skilled at recognizing the divinity within each person, and knows how to capitalize on the person's particular strong

points in order to help him bring the evidence of that divinity to the surface.

People with these characteristics epitomize most completely all that true Christianity stands for. They, too, are the ones who achieve results with the so-called "hopeless" among their fellow men. Possessing a full measure of enlightened sympathy and creative tolerance, they do not hesitate to associate themselves with social outcasts of one sort or another in order to help them. Some of these people—although still a relatively rare few — were once social outcasts themselves and have made, in one lifetime, a remarkable transition from depravity to integrity and magnanimity. We have all heard and read of former drug addicts and alcoholics, for instance, who are now actively helping others afflicted with these iniquitous habits. Theirs has probably been the keenest suffering of all and, knowing first-hand what it is like to be in the dire, selfinflicted predicament of drug addiction or alcoholism, they are eager to help others rise above this degradation, as they themselves have learned to do. Here is exemplified the mellowing process at its most intense.

Thus we see that, although suffering appears to be an integral part of the evolutionary process — thanks largely man's inability or disinclination to learn by precept and observation instead of by experience — it does serve a useful, even indispensable, purpose. "The cross of Christ is the pledge to us that the deepest suffering may be the condition of the highest blessing..." said Dean Stanley. We each have our own cross to bear, and our own self-inflicted torments to endure. Let us take heart from the knowledge that, by patiently sustaining and learning from them, we, too, are "mellowing." In time, and in proportion as we learn to live and serve in concert with God's laws, we, too, will be blessed with that gentle, sensitive, loving, and radiant nobility of character which epitomizes the spiritually evolved Ego.



The currents of the animal Group Spirits, on the other hand, encircle the Earth. The comparatively weak and invisible currents generated by the Group Spirits of the plants, and the very strong powerful rays of force generated by the Christ Spirit now becoming visible as the Aurora Borealis, have hitherto been of about the same nature as static electricity. while the currents generated by the animal Group Spirits and which encircle the Earth may be likened to dynamic electricity which gave the Earth its power of motion in by-gone ages. Now, however, the Christ currents are becoming more and more forceful and their static electricity is being liberated. The etheric impulse which they give will inaugurate a new era, and the sense organs now possessed by mankind must accommodate themselves to this change. Instead of the etheric rays which emanate from an object bringing a reflected image to the retina of our eye, the so-called "blind



spot" will be sensitized and we shall look out through the eye and see directly the thing itself instead of the image upon our retina. Then we shall not only see the surface of the thing we observe, but we shall be able to see through it as those who have cultivated the etheric vision do now.

As time goes on and the Christ by His beneficent ministrations attracts more and more of the interplanetary ether to the Earth, thus making its vital body more luminous, we shall be walking in a sea of light, and when we learn to forsake our ways of selfishness and egotism through the constant contact with these beneficent Christ vibrations, we also shall become luminous. Then the eve as it is now constituted would not be of service to us; therefore it is now beginning to change and we are experiencing the discomfort incident to all reconstruction. It may be said further with reference to the Aurora Borealis and its effects upon us, that these rays are radiated through every part of the Earth, which is the body of Christ, from the center to the periphery, but in the inhabited parts of the world these rays are absorbed by humanity as the rays of the plant Group Spirits are absorbed by the flower. These rays constitute the "inner urge" which is slowly but surely impelling mankind to adopt an attitude of altruism. They are the impregnating rays which fructify the soul, so that eventually the immaculate conception will take place and the Christ will be born within each of us. When we have all thus become perfectly impregnated, the Christ Light will begin to radiate from us. Then we shall walk in the Light as He is in the Light, and we shall all have Fellowship, one with another.

Just a few words concerning collective destiny will end these lessons:

Besides the individual destiny generated by ourselves in each life, there is also a collective destiny which we incur by the fact that we are members of a community or a nation. It is well known that communities sometimes act as a whole, either for good or for evil, and it is only reasonable that these collective actions should also have a collective effect in future lives upon the members of that community or nation which takes part in them. It is found that when these acts are evil the debt thus contracted is generally liquidated in the course of accidents, so called, on a large scale. It has been taught as a matter of fact that there are no accidents save where man, who has the divine prerogative of initiating new causes, breaks into other lives and thereby causes a change in their affairs, or when by carelessness he takes the life of a fellow-being. The latter is an accident in many cases. But such great cataclysms as that which we witnessed in Sicily, and such as the San Francisco earthquake, the great European War, etc., are not accidents, but are causative acts of the community involved or the result of such acts in past lives. Knowing what we do of the working of the laws of infant mortality, we can readily realize, for instance, that as so many hundreds of thousands of victims of the Great War have passed out upon the battle field where it is absolutely impossible for them to etch in the panorama of their past life, it will be necessary for them to pass out in the next existence during childhood, and how can this wholesale death come to the infants of a future age save through some epidemic or some cataclysm which will sweep the

Earth? On that hypothesis we may see in the Sicilian earthquake, San Francisco's destruction, the famines in Ireland and India, and similar national catastrophes, the workings of destiny from the past, bringing to each nation the fruits of its past lives and actions as a community.

What has been said in the foregoing pages is a very slight hint of how we make and unmake destiny. Please remember that the few hundred cases investigated do not give an adequate basis for a general idea of the scope of the Law, and the student is bound to find incongruities in individual cases regarding what has been said. Questions will undoubtedly present themselves regarding this, that, or the other specific case, and while it is easy enough to investigate single cases and state what causes in one life produced certain effects in another life of one person, it is very different when we come to tabulate them and endeavor to form a general law, as we have tried to do in the present work....Personally, the writer has gained much more knowledge than he has been able to communicate, but he hopes nevertheless that what has been said may be of some little use to the student as hints concerning the great mystery of life.

Preparations for Rebirth

- Q. What is the state of the Spirit prior to rebirth?
- Previous to taking the dip into matter, the threefold Spirit is naked, having only the forces of the four seed atoms (which are the nuclei of the threefold body and the sheath of mind).
- To what might its descent be compared?
- A. Its descent resembles the putting on of several pairs of gloves of increasing thickness.
 - What first occurs? Q.

The Rite of the Footwashing

References: John 13:4-17; Luke 9:48; Matthew 23:23, 25, 27.

THE two words which encompass the entire life and work of the Master are love and humility. Nowhere in the Hebrew or any other oriental scripture is there a more touching representation of these qualities than in the story of the Foot Washing as it is told in the New Testament. Throughout the Gospels the Master warns against the sins which stand, as it were, in contrast to the divine virtues of love and humility; and His denunciations of hypocrisy and pride, the contraries of love and humility, are particularly scathing. It is only in the Gospel of John, however, that the Rite of the Foot Washing occurs, the most humble of the Master's deeds, for it was not a miracle such as had excited the admiration of the multitude and the respect of the Disciples. It was a simple, domestic act which anyone could perform and which carried with it no halo of fame or extrinsic reward.

According to oriental custom, the feet were clad only in sandals. It was the duty of servants to perform this menial service for guests, pouring water on the feet as they were held over a basin, and drying them with a towel. The Disciples had made no effort toward thus serving Christ Jesus, nor yet one another. They were occupied instead with disputations among themselves as to "which of them was accounted to be the greatest." When the Master observed their selfish personal ambitions He gently and lovingly took upon Himself the lowly task of performing this service for them. "What I do, thou knowest not now, but thou shalt know hereafter."

This simple deed has emphasized humility as the most essential requisite

for aspirants to Christian attainment. "I have given you an example that ye should do as I have done unto you."

The Philosopher's Stone, that celestial body which Paul describes in the fifth chapter of II Corinthians, that body which becomes either as a diamond or a ruby stone, depending upon the type of development, is not built when courting the adulation of throngs or seeking positions of prominence. The lofty spiritual development of the Christ lifted Him to the heights of the Transfiguration, and His love for humanity caused Him to take upon Himself the form of a servant and to be fashioned in the likeness of man.

John's is the only Gospel in which the denial of Peter is foretold. The other three simply record the fact after its occurrence. At the conclusion of the Last Supper at which He has given His Disciples His deepest esoteric instruction, the Master had but one more word for them, and that was love.

"A new commandment I give unto you, That ye love one another; as I have loved you, that ye also love one another.


"By this shall all men know that ye are my disciples, if ye have love one to another."

This commandment is as applicable to the present age as when spoken by the Lord of Love. Just so long as there are wars and rumors of wars, so long as man hates his fellow-man and seeks revenge for wrongs, we are Christians in little more than profession and aspiration, for we are still in that attitude of mind or state of consciousness which belongs to the Jehovistic regime and the external law of the Ten Commandments. Christians are followers of that Way which is set forth in the Sermon on the Mount. Not until we begin to live these precepts are we truly Christians; before that we are

says Blake, who possessed in an eminent degree this form of sacramental perception, "is in the Eye of others only a green thing that stands in the Way."

Many censure artists for painting ugly things, but they are only striving to show us a beauty to which we are blind. They have marched ahead of us and attained that higher vision which Blake possessed, in which the visionary sees the whole visible universe transfigured because he had "put off the rotten rags of sense and memory," and put on Imagination uncorrupt.

"I know," says this extraordinary man, "that this world is a world of imagination and vision. I see everything I paint in this world, but everybody does not see alike. To the eye of the miser a guinea is far more beautiful than the sun and a bag worn with the use of money has more beautiful proportions than a vine filled with grapes. "... Some see Nature all ridicule and deformity, and to these I shall not regulate my proportions, and some scarce see Nature at all. But to the eyes of the man of imagination, Nature is Imagination itself. As a man is, so he sees. As the eye is formed, such are its powers. You certainly mistake when you say that the visions of fancy are not to be found in this world. To me this world is all continued vision of fancy or imagination and I feel flattered when I am told so."

Another seer, Ralph Waldo Emerson, reminds us that nature is loved by what is best in us. He says the sunset is unlike anything that is underneath it: it wants men. He sees man fallen, but nature, he reminds us, is erect. If our own lives flowed with the right energy, we should shame the sunset or the flowing brook. We should out-dazzle in beauty the fair flowers and become fully as splendid as the shining jewels of heaven, the stars. But alas, man is yet fallen. He is a beggar instead of a Prince.

With his Moon in Cancer trining Uranus in Pisces, his Sun and Jupiter in the 5th house trining Neptune, and Mercury in the 5th squaring Mars in Leo, Blake was inclined to employ effective and even startling methods of teaching, calculated to strike the imagination of the onlooker or listener. Yet often the more inspired his utterances, the more passionately and dogmatically Christian they become.

"We behold

Where Death eternal is put off eternally. O Lamb,

Assume the dark satanic body in the Virgin's womb.

O Lamb divine, it cannot thee annoy.
O pitying One,

Thy pity is from the foundation of the world, and thy Redemption Begins already in eternity."

This is the doctrine of the Incarnation in a nutshell.

Of the following quotations from Blake's "Jerusalem," the first is only a poet's gloss on the Roman Catholic's cry, "O felix culpa"; the second is an epitome of Christian theology and ethics:

"If I were pure, never could I taste the sweets

Of the forgiveness of sins. If I were holy,
I never could behold the tears of
love,... O Mercy! O divine Humanity!
O Forgiveness! O Pity and Compassion!

If I were pure I should never have known thee."

"Would'st thou love one who never died for thee or ever die for one who had not died for thee?

And if God dieth not for man and giveth not Himself

Eternally for man, Man could not exist, for Man is love

As God is love. Every kindness to another is a little death in the divine Image, Nor can Man exist but by brotherhood."

The Christ Spirit is to be discovered not merely symbolically but in the ecstatic and abounding life of the world. For, in the rapturous vitality of the birds, in their graceful, proud flight; in the swelling of buds and the sacrificial beauty of the flowers; in the great and solemn rhythms of the sea—there is somewhat of Bethlehem in all these things, somewhat too of Calvary in their self-giving, noble pains. It was this rediscovery of Nature's Christliness which Blake desired so fervently. To him it is not that each object is important because

existing in the Body of God, so much as the truth that God, standing behind or back of all that is, is all-important. For, as Emerson says, "From within or from behind, a light shines through us upon things, and makes us aware that we are nothing, but the light is all."

Potentially, each man is All—"in every bosom a universe expands"—and the beginning of the way or Path is in himself, is an inner eye too long disused, in a capacity for vision and self-surrender and soul unfoldment.

"To see a World in a Grain of Sand And a Heaven in a Wild Flower, Hold Infinity in the palm of your hand And Eternity in an hour."

Blake's "To see a world in a grain of sand"; Tennyson's "Flower in the crannied wall," Vaughan's "Each bush and oak doth know I AM," are reports of things seen in the spiritual consciousness. If we can see how the thing stands in God or in spiritual consciousness, we shall then know any particular thing, and everything, and every man.

"...In Your own bosom you bear your Heaven and Earth and all you behold; Though it appears Without it is Within, In your imagination of which this World of Mortality is but a shadow."

Inherently, Blake believed, as well he might, every man is clairvoyant, and endowed with the faculties of imagination and intuition with which to cognize the truths and beauties of the higher realms. To perceive more and more of heaven in everything is man's most important work here. As an artist, he must transcend earth things and reveal the glories that lie beyond. For Blake to do this was not difficult, for he had not only the purely imaginary faculty highly developed (Moon in Cancer trine Uranus in Pisces), but also the ability to see beings in the invisible realms (Neptune trine Sun and Jupiter). Both were drawn upon for his paintings as well as for his poetry.

Blake maintained that "If the door of perception were cleansed, everything would appear to man as it is, infinite." Yet this cannot occur, he tells us, until

man ceases to dogtrot a dull round of sense existence. Humanity must demonstrate a laudable imagination and freedom and courage, as against dull routine and timidity. In other words, man, the Spirit, must transcend the lower self and the things of the earth, unfolding the inherent spiritual faculties with which he as a child of God is endowed, and thus become more and more aware of the realities and wonders of the superphysical realms. Spirit triumphant is the objective he holds up to mankind.

The birth of William Blake occurred in London, November 28, 1757. His father, James Blake, of whose family and origin nothing is known, was a hosier living at 28 Broad St., Golden Square. His mother's maiden name was never recorded. The family consisted of four sons and a daughter. William was the second son and the only one to achieve distinction. The third son, John, died young after a life of dissipation. (Blake's Mars in the third house, brothers and sisters, square Mercury in Scorpio in the fifth.) The voungest, Robert, who showed considerable ability as an artist, was greatly loved by William and tenderly nursed by him through an illness of which he died at twenty-five years. (Sun, ruling third, conjunct Jupiter and square Mars in the third. Also, note the Moon and Ascendant in Cancer, the sympathetic, nursing sign.)

Artistic leanings began to show early in the life of this genius. Note the ruler of the Ascendant, the imaginative Moon, in opposition to the artistic Venus, also Venus sextile Uranus in Pisces. The latter aspect gave him an unusual taste and genuine artistic ability. His ability to see into the invisible realms was also apparent at an early age, for it is recorded that his parents were faced with the problem of punishing him when he matter-of-factly spoke of having seen a tree full of angels and of having had an encounter with Ezekiel. Although his parents did not understand their unusual son, yet they fortunately were more tolerant than most parents of that day would have been toward his "eccentricities." Because the sensitive child was so horrified at seeing children whipped at school, his father refrained from forcing him to attend. Most of his education was therefore obtained at home by reading and the assistance of other members of the family. (Mercury, ruler of the third house, squaring Mars in the third.)

Blake's father wisely decided to encourage William's artistic bent and sent him at the age of ten to Par's drawing school in the Strand. (The progressed Sun in the fifth, sextile to Saturn.) He also gave him casts to draw from and allowed him to buy prints after the Old Masters. In 1771 (the progressed Sun semisextile Venus and square Uranus. and progressed Moon trine Saturn) he was apprenticed to Besire, the engraver, and served his time faithfully in learning the conventional (Saturn) style of engraving. He also made drawings of the monuments in Westminster Abbey and these were engraved for Gough's "Sepulchral Monuments." His mind was greatly influenced by the surroundings in which he worked, and the Gothic style was to him the ideal, "the living form," forever after. "Angels Hovering over the Body of Jesus' is the title of a painting well illustrating this ideal. The artist also cultivated his mind in other ways, reading Burke, Bacon, and a translation of Winckelman, indicating an interest in political and social reform which later took on larger proportions.

Blake's creative fancy-note three planets, including the all-powerful Sun in Sagittarius, in his creative fifth house—found its outlet in those early years in poetry, some of which survives in the thin volume of "Practical Sketches," printed by his friends in 1783. These pieces were composed between his 12th and 20th years. They remained unknown and therefore had no influence on the poetry of that time. Nevertheless. they were the forerunners of the freer age in poetry which began some twenty years later. In these poems, too, may be found hints of the radical political ideas expressed more forcibly later on.

In 1778 Blake completed his apprenticeship, being then twenty-one, and set out to earn his own living as a professional engraver. He executed many commissions for booksellers and publishers for the next twenty years, largely supporting himself by this means. In 1780 (the progressed Sun trining Mars in Leo) he first exhibited pictures at the Royal Academy where they were admired by Romney.

Friends for the Retarded

Margaret Johnston and Don Oliver (not their real names) are planning to get married. They love each other, but there are problems: Both are mentally retarded. Surprisingly, the trouble lies not with their handicaps—each has recently moved from institutions to approved boarding houses in the community, and each now has a job—but with the social retardation they suffer as a result of having been isolated in an institution.

Like many of the retarded, who experts believe could lead comfortable, independent lives in the community, Margaret and Don find the adjustment to normal life very difficult. Ordinary encounters, like asking bus directions or making friends on the job, require extraordinary courage.

Now, thanks to a new program that is spreading across the U.S. and Canada, that adjustment may come a little more easily.

Margaret and Don are among the growing number of retardates who have a Citizen Advocate—someone who is committed to representing their interests. In other words, Margaret and Don have a friend. Her name is Debbie, a young woman the same age as Margaret who understands the couple's complex problems. "I have to constantly reassure Margaret that I just want to be her friend, that I'm not one more person trying to run her life," Debbie says. The two women discuss everything, from how Margaret should decorate her room to what marriage will really be like.

One of the virtues of the Citizen Advocacy program is its extreme versatility. Debbie and Margaret are free to work out their friendship in their own way. Other relationships are also unique—responsive only to the needs and talents of the two individuals.

Jim, a college dropout, for instance, is the Advocate of a teen-age boy from the inner city. "I try to expose him to new experiences. Like hiking," Jim explains. "He'd never

been to the mountains before, and he loved it.

Suzy, another Citizen Advocate, knows that what John, a young retardate who lives at home, needs most is a job. She approaches prospective employers for John, and, when she finds him a place, she will work with him for a while to help him learn the ropes.

The idea for Citizen Advocates originated with Dr. Wolf Wolfensberger, an internationally recognized clinical psychologist who believed that established relationships—public guardians, trustees or custodians—had failed to meet the needs of the handicapped.

His advocacy concept, which was rejected at first as "too idealistic," was eventually tried out in Nebraska. Its success there led the National Association for Retarded Children to recommend Citizen Advocacy to its local chapters; several states are now well into pilot programs of their own. The Denver Association, for example, set up a program for Colorado in January and expects to have 60 relationships formed by this month. Funds, which come from both public and private sources, pay for a full-time coordinator, who enlists and trains the advocates and pairs them with the retarded.

The advocates are recruited from all backgrounds and all ages—although the majority are in their twenties. In fact, says Robert Luckey, consultant in Program Services for the NARC, "it's the young and their dedication to human rights that have made the whole advocacy idea possible."

Inventor Claims Car Uses Vegetable Oil

Richard Clem claims that if the automobile industry would adopt his new invention, the American motorist would change the oil in his car only every 150,000 miles and in between not buy any gas.

That might come as a shock to Detroit and the petroleum industry, but Clem, a heavy equipment operator for the city of Dallas and a spare time inventor, said he has discovered what French fries and hash browns have known for years—that vegetable oil is a hot product.

He said his motor—much of which he won't divulge—uses eight gallons of vegetable oil for fuel....

His motor is mounted in a bright red car but he said if it is made large enough, "this type of engine could power ships, aircraft, even provide enough power to produce electricity for large cities.

"I use vegetable oil because right now the engine is running at 300 degrees," said Clem, 43. "Water would boil and evaporate and conventional motor oil would break down."

The only apparent outside source of power in his car is a 12-volt battery, which Clem said "is used only to start the engine. Once started you can throw the battery away." He said, however, the battery also powers the car's lights and horn....

Outside the meager electrical portion of the system used to start the motor and run the lights and horn, the power plant consists of a seven stage pump and a "converter."

The pump, as he described it, is used to move the oil, under pressure, from a storage area to the converter from where the energy is converted into enough power to turn the motor, move the oil back to the storage area and power the pump, which in turn continues the cycle.

One hint as to the contents of the converter is "It acts like a turbine but it isn't a turbine" in the normal sense of the word, Clem said....

Mr. Clem's invention is intriguing, but its economic and ecological implications are staggering. If such an automobile can be produced on a large scale, and if, furthermore, it becomes practical also to power aircraft and ships in this manner, the gasoline and fuel oil industries and their employees would suffer. On the other hand, noxious gasoline emissions and disastrous oil leaks and spills would become a thing of the past, and new jobs will be created in the "vegetable oil industry." In fact, the problem then will be to expand vegetable production to the point where it is sufficient for both universal food, as well as universal transportation, needs.

As the New Age approaches, many new as yet incredible, inventions will come to light and supersede the older, more cumbersome, machinery and other physical structures attendant to our daily life. Some degree of upheaval always exists in transferring from obsolete to modern, and scientific advancements now are being made more rapidly than ever in history. Nevertheless, and even with resulting temporary dislocations, many remarkable and advantageous changes will be-

come possible in our physical surroundings during the next generations. Their ultimate value, however, will depend upon the extent to which humanity will be able to regard them, and all material things, in the underlying spiritual framework of human evolution.

Study Reveals Drugs Slowed Child's Growth

Using drugs to control the behavior of hyperactive children could suppress their growth, according to a Maryland research group.

In a study released in the current New England Journal of Medicine, researchers at the Baltimore County Department of Health said two commonly used drugs suppressed the normal weight gain of 29 children surveyed.

The drugs, dextroamphetamine and methylphenidate, are used to decrease restlessness in overactive, impulsive and easily distracted school children.

In one group of 20 children surveyed, between the ages of 8 and 11, 13 were on drugs during the school year and taken off during the summer. Seven others continued medication throughout the year.

All 20 continued to gain weight while on drugs, but at about 50% the rate normal for their ages. The children taken off drugs during the summer showed a sharp increase in weight gain for that period, about 130% the average for their ages.

One of the researchers, Dr. Daniels Safer, said in an interview that the children taken off drugs during the summer appeared to compensate for some of the weight not gained while on medication.

The Baltimore study said the reasons why drugs restricted growing in children are not clear, but researchers noted that many children on drugs ate less than others their ages, an effect noted in adults. The study also noted that such drugs suppress sleep in adults and a similar effect in children could reduce the relaxed time needed to secrete growth hormone.

If the weight and size of growing children is affected by these drugs, it is not unreasonable to assume that the efficiency of their vital organs is also being affected. Such damage during formative years usually cannot be completely eradicated later when the individual has grown up. Furthermore, the fact that these drugs may suppress the sleep that

children so vitally need is another indication of their potential harm.

Certainly, hyperactive children must be helped to calm down and channel their energies wisely and constructively. There are natural ways of doing this, however. Although parents, teachers, and doctors must expend considerable time and patience when working with the children along these natural lines, the ultimate results will be more effective and lasting than those produced by drugs. Equally important, the dangerous side-effects of drugs are thus eliminated.

Minimizing Noise

Antinoise ordinances are notoriously difficult to enforce, especially for vehicles. The best that police can do—if they are inclined to do anything—is give an occasional tidket to drivers of autos of motorcycles with unmuffled or poorly muffled exhausts. Experts say that public education about the hazards of noise may be a more effective approach.

The National Research Council of Canada has set up a "noise thermometer" on streets in Edmonton, Alta., which graphically shows motorists the A-weighted decibels given out by their vehicles and compares them with legal levels. A microphone alongside the road picks up the vehicle sound. Then a little farther ahead, a lighted and easily read 8-foot-high device resembling a thermometer displays to motorists (and motorcyclists) the decibel ratings of their vehicles and the legal limit for the type of vehicle.

NASA is trying to produce a quiet engine for its STOL (short take off and landing) aircraft.... Recently it awarded the General Electric Co.'s Aircraft Engine Group in Cincinnati a \$1,236,500 contract for testing a promising method called "inlet choking" to be used with augmentor wing craft. The term is misleading, says Robert S. Ruggeri, manager of the project at NASA's Lewis Research Center. The main idea is to choke or control the flow of air coming into the engine until the air reaches the speed of about Mach 1, the speed of sound. When air speed is controlled at the speed of sound, the noise generated by the engine fan and compressor cannot propagate out through the choked area. Noise still comes out the back

"The Jesus Generation"

The Jesus Generation, by Billy Graham. Zondervan Publishing House, Grand Rapids, Michigan, 1971.

THIS book was written primarily for "that alienated, rebellious, uncommitted majority" of young people who are still searching for "individual identity... a challenge, and a faith." In it, Mr. Graham outlines the major features of the "Jesus movement" that has so strongly appealed to a large segment of heretofore troubled youth, and shows how faith in Christ, manifested in the practice of Christian morality, Christian involvement, and Christian service, can dispell the problems of "hang-ups," "bad vibes," "cop-outs," and other phenomena endemic in the life of modern young people.

Mr. Graham admits that the older generation erred in presenting material instead of spiritual values as paramount goals of endeavor. Determined that their children not suffer the privations of depression as they had done, parents of the present adolescents and young adults endowed them with a proliferation of "things," but were unable to eliminate the wars, hatreds, and social injustices against which youth is now protesting. Nevertheless, continues Mr. Graham, the reactions of the drug culture - avoiding responsibilities and seeking escape in the form of hallucinogens or of the militant advocates of violence, right no wrong, and serve only to insure the mental, moral, and physical decay of participants.

Despite the seeming "ungodliness" of some segments of "wild youth," Mr. Graham, who, incognito, has attended rock festivals and studied the younger generation on its own grounds, is convinced that the youth rebellion "is not against true faith. It is not against Christ, nor against God, nor against any genuine spiritual experience. Rather, it is against the pinch and pressure of a secular and materialistic society."

Those who are now a part of the Jesus movement, he believes, have passed the stage of rebellion and, buttressed by their new spiritual security, faith, and love, can reach out and help their troubled companions in a way that few adults, and no material means, have been able to match. The only sure cure for drug addiction, for instance, as one drug expert told Mr. Graham, is a "genuine religious experience." Reports of instant and painless cures of heroin addiction among converts to the Jesus movement are numerous.

Not surprisingly, it is the impression of spiritual love and harmony emanating from the ranks of the "Jesus people" that seems most strongly to draw outsiders. Certainly, anyone who has spent time in the company of the "Jesus people" cannot help but experience the power of the love force working through them. Mr. Graham recounts testimony from a number of converts, much of which echoed the sentiments of one girl who said: "I met people there who had the love and peace in their hearts that I had always wanted.

They said the answer to my search was Jesus Christ...With Jesus deep in my heart, at last I had a purpose for living and for giving." Recognizing the importance of this force, Mr. Graham says, "The first and second commandments are the only therapy the world has ever needed."

Other characteristics of the Jesus revolution include its spontaneity, with no one single leader at the helm of the It is extensively Biblemovement. oriented, and its adherents have a strong sense of social responsibility and firm commitment to the upright moral behavior of true Christian discipleship. It is, of course, centered around the person of Jesus Christ, who is viewed, in the orthodox light, as the Son of God, a personal saviour, and the world's one unifying factor. Primarily, Mr. Graham is impressed with the sincerity of the "Jesus people," and is convinced that the movement is destined to be lasting, rather than just another of the evanescent fads that seem perpetually to spring up and disappear in youthful society.

Although Mr. Graham believes that spiritual commitment to the Jesus movement is one course which will enable troubled, searching, uncertain youth to "find themselves" and gain meaning in their lives, he warns that neither inner harmony nor a life of ease will automatically follow. He speaks of the ensuing inner conflict between what occult students know as the lower nature and the Higher Self. Former bad habits will not necessarily break their hold simply because of a religious commitment, however sincere. The convert will experience both the old temptation to sin, and a new and bitter remorse when he gives in to this temptation. "Now it is up to you to yield to the reign and control of the new nature which is dominated by Christ." This means, of course, in the esoteric sense, domination by the Christ within.

The conditions for being a true Christian, says Mr. Graham, are hard. "Only a few are willing to pay the price.

Christ's way is a way of discipline, renunciation, and hardship." Self-denial. self-sacrifice, social awareness and action, acceptance and fulfillment of responsibilities, personal and moral cleanliness, and above all else, compassion and brotherhood, are the hallmarks of true Christian behavior. It is not enough merely to "accept" Christ, although this is a first step. After accepting Him, a person must learn to live as He would have us live. Once he begins to do this once he starts actively to practice the Christian Teaching of love — he will experience fulfillment, contentment, and a sense of identity offered by no other practice, cult, or social nostrum.

Deploring the current trend to sexual freedom and promiscuity, Mr. Graham stresses the need for moral purity and opposes pre-marital sex for any reason. Although he does not speak of the sacred creative force in its esoteric context, he does say that sexual desires, when controlled, may be "transformed to a more noble purpose."

As is to be expected, some of the specific biblical and other interpretations made by Mr. Graham are strictly orthodox in nature, and do not incorporate the more far-reaching clarifications of the esoteric Teachings. He speaks, for instance, of youth's "illusion" that man is naturally good. He cites evidence of world-wide villainy and corruption as proof that man's natural goodness is merely an illusion, and that man actually is sinful by nature. This appears to contradict his own contention that the sincere advocates of the Jesus movement are living highly moral, useful lives. Furthermore, the esoteric student knows that the Spirit of each individual, the divine spark of God which is the real inner man, is good, and, being a part of God, cannot be otherwise. Certainly, many people presently are allowing their lower natures temporarily to hold sway. but in the ultimate, the incorruptible Spirit will triumph and man will manifest his innate godliness.

Seed Atoms and Our Responsibility

Question:

Two statements from the Rosicrucian Fellowship literature appear to be contradictory: "The force in the Seed Atom, like the forces in all other atoms, is the undifferentiated life of God;" and "It is the quality of the Seed Atom that differentiates one person from another and it is this atom which the aspirant seeks to cleanse." How can we cleanse an atom that has been exclusively God's creation, imposed upon us without our choice? Or must we understand that this creation of God is not altogether perfect? In that case, how can we be held responsible for its imperfections?

Answer:

Basically, the answer to this question lies in the fact that although all life, including that in our own seed atoms, comes from God and is, therefore, in itself innately perfect, it is what we do with the life thus given us that must be cleansed.

The undifferentiated life of God is pure and spiritual. When bestowed upon us it is perfect, just as God is perfect. If we, in our turn, were able to maintain the element of perfection in our conduct just as God maintains it in His, the quality of our seed atoms would remain untainted and not need cleansing.

At the present time, however, human beings are far from perfect in their attitudes and behavior. The selfish desires of the lower nature hold sway, and few members of the life-wave have as yet risen to the point where their Higher Selves are consistently dominant. Most of us, therefore, are guilty in greater or

lesser degree of various infractions of natural law which make for imperfection. Our thoughts and deeds cause the essence of these unfavorable characteristics to be imprinted on our seed atoms, just as the essence of our good qualities, which contributes to the ultimate perfection of our natures, is also stamped thereon.

In this way, we are now differentiated one from another. Some of us are possessed of an abundance of favorable qualities, and others are plainly marked with unworthy traits. In neither case can we hold God responsible. The responsibility is solely ours. We are imbued with His life, but we have the free will to do with it as we please. Before we can return to Him at the end of our evolutionary journey, however, we must root out all the imperfections which we have built into our characters. This is why it is particularly incumbent upon the spiritual aspirant to purify his nature and purge himself of all reprehensible attributes. Only he can do this, and only when he does so will he be spiritually immaculate as was the innocent Virgin Spirit who first proceeded from God on his involutionary and evolutionary journey through matter. Then, enriched by his experiences, he will be both pure and wise. He will have attained to his full potential of divinity. His acquired individuality, formed as a result of the totality of his evolutionary experiences, will then be perfect, as is the life, from God, which flows through him.

Natural and Chemical Foods Question:

What are the "higher plants" referred to on page 458 of the Cosmo-Conception? Also on this page is mentioned the fact

that "our laboratories will some time supply us with chemical food of a quality far surpassing anything that we now have...". Are such foods available at the present time?

Answer:

The "higher plants," meaning those members of the plant life-wave which are farthest advanced, are the palm and fruit trees. Food from these plants decays more rapidly than food from the less advanced plants, and, as many housewives can attest, some fruits do have a tendency to decay more quickly than vegetables. Nevertheless, at this point in our evolution it is not only permissible, but desirable, that we eat fruit, which is rich in natural food essentials.

The fairly rapid rate of decay of some fruit is caused by the individual particles attempting to escape from the composite whole. Man, nevertheless, can assimilate these particles with relative ease. Even the highest plants do not yet have desire bodies. Particles of meat, on the other hand, have been inter-penetrated by the desire bodies of the animals and have thus been individualized to a much greater extent than those of any plants. For this reason, meat particles are much more difficult to assimilate when eaten by man.

It is true that some splendid nutritive supplements are now being manufactured in our laboratories, but they are regarded by nutritionists as supplements to, and not replacements for, natural foods. We do not believe that these supplements, excellent as they are, constitute that "chemical food of a quality far surpassing anything that we now have" to which Mr. Heindel referred. This type of food is still to be developed, and may be a product of the Aquarian Age.

of the plane, but by choking off forward-propagating noise, the engineers hope to reduce the total noise to 88 or 90 decibels. This compares with 95 to 120 decibels for today's aircraft.

Although noise is still a disturbing and hazardous factor of modern life (see Rays, July 1972, p. 319), it is good to see that the aircraft industry is trying to reduce the noise made by its products. We believe that other industries are also working on ways of minimizing noise.

We agree with the experts who claim that public education may be the most effective approach to noise pollution. Not too long ago, nobody had heard of a "litter-bug." Now, all segments of the population, from school children through their grandparents, are involved in ridding the environment of trash and maintaining clean neighborhoods and countrysides. Measures are being taken to fight air and water pollution which would have been undreamed of a few years ago, all because of the insistence and action of public-minded citizens, ecology groups, and other organizations. Granted, much remains to be done, but that a good beginning has been made at all is due to intensified awareness of the problem an awareness which has come about because of public education.

Might not the same thing be possible with regard to noise pollution? Certainly the noise made by cars, motorcycles, record players, musical instruments and numerous other contrivances operated by private individuals could be considerably lessened if an aroused citizenry were to take the offenders to task. Industrial noises, the sounds of construction work, etc., are not so easy to control but, again, "anti-noise" organizations and lobbyists could be just as effective as their anti-pollution counterparts. First, however, they must be organized.



Nutritional Astrology

A balanced diet requires a variety of proteins, carbohydrates, fats, mineral elements, fruit acids, vitamins and cellulose. A goodly supply of vegetables and fruits is always safe, such as: asparagus, Jupiter; avocado; almonds, Sun and Jupiter; apples, Venus; cabbage, raw, Moon; carrots, Venus and Mercury; celery; cheese, cottage; dandelion, Jupiter; egg yolk; endive, Moon; herbs—anise, Jupiter; celery seed; chives; horehound, Mercury; parsley, Mercury; sorrel, Venus—; leafy vegetables; lettuce, green, Moon; onions, green, Mars; walnuts, Sun; pea-

When preparing salads, be sure ingredients are perfectly dry by whirling in salad basket or old pillow case, handling quickly and lightly. Rub salad bowl well with fresh garlic. Break lettuce, etc., into attractive bite size pieces. When using two greens, one should be snappy like watercress, while the other is mild like Romaine. Add several tablespoons finely chopped parsley. Add one tablespoon oil, pouring over the leaves. Lift leaves from underneath with salad fork and spoon, tossing in circular motion to permit oil completely to cover each leaf (about 10 tosses per Tbs. oil) with no oil remaining in bowl. Add other vegetables - best to use just two or three. Should more oil be needed, now is time to add. Add seasonings. Squeeze juice of half lemon over all. May be made whole meal by addition of desired protein — sliced egg, avocado, nuts or whatever.

In other respects, too, Mr. Graham expresses a more limited view of spiritual realities than do students of the esoteric Teachings. Nevertheless, we believe that this book represents an important contribution to modern spiritual literature. It sets forth a fine series of guidelines for those young people who are still searching for ways in which to carry out their ideals for themselves and society in general, and for those who have taken the extremist "ways out" offered by drugs or militantism. It also will be read profitably by perplexed parents and other adults who would like better to understand the moods, convictions, frustrations, and general philosophy of modern youth.

Whether orthodox or esoteric, the important thing at the present time is that many young people are being led to Christian beliefs and practices. As Mr. Graham makes clear, the essential thing is to live the life of Christian commitment, helpfulness, and moral purity. Certainly he has done a great deal to instil this concept into the minds of people of all ages and generations. This, his latest book, underlines the concept anew and emphasizes its pertinence particularly in the lives of the young.

Suddenly, while the minister was still reading, Debbie noticed that a white light which had not been there before was filling the church. It was a soft light, but somehow very bright, too, and


the Christmas lights and the candles seemed pale next to it. The new light was everywhere — it seemed to go through the ceiling and the floor, and even through all the people.



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CELERY LOAF

Put through food chopper 1/2 cup chopped celery, ½ small onion, 3/8 cup of nuts, using medium cutter. Add 3/4 cup tomato juice, ½ Tbs. gratted cheese, 1 tsp. vegetable salt, 1 Tbs. melited butter, 2/3 cup dry wholewhealt crumbs; mix thoroughly. Add one beaten egg and mix in lightly. Put into glass baking dish which has been greased with vegetable oil and evenly sprinkled on the bottom with additional bread crumbs. Bake in 350 degree F. oven until farm enough to be turned out; invert onto platter. Garnish with green pea sauce and generous sprinkling of chopped parsley. Serves 4.
